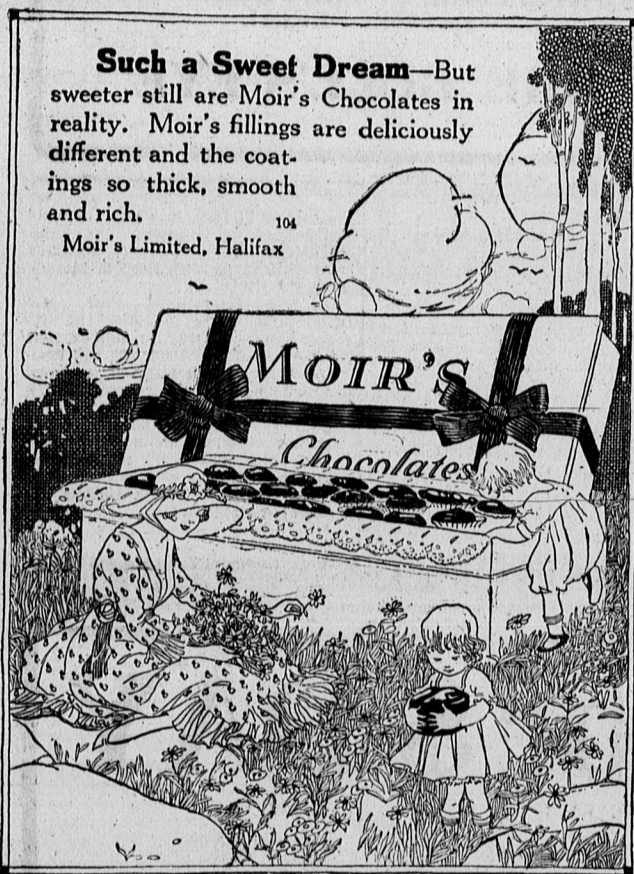

PASTORAL CHANGES.—The St. John Times says:—Rev. Hammond Johnson pastor of Queen Square Methodist church, will leave next week for Moncton, where he is to take charge of Wesley Memorial church. He is to be succeeded by Rev. George Morris of Tryon, P. E. I. who will be here about July 1. During the months of July and August Centenary and Queen Square churches are to unite.

PRESENTATION AT POWNAL.—Previous to her departure for Waltham, Mass., Mrs. Wellington Young, a former resident of Earnscliffe, was entertained at lunch by the members of the Pownal Red Cross, and presented with a valuable travelling suitcase, as a token of the members' esteem and good will. Mrs. Young has always been an active and energetic member of the Red Cross, and contributed very materially toward the knitting of the 364 pairs of socks that the Pownal members sent to the boys in France since last November.

THE COST OF SALT HERRING.—The cost of salt herring keeps up. In the Halifax retail market fifty-five cents per dozen is asked, which is cheaper than in four other provinces, and dearer than in one. Manitoba heads the list, the price in Winnipeg being 90 cents per dozen. In Saskatchewan the price is 87 cents, Quebec 69, Ontario 56, New Brunswick 56, British Columbia 60, and only one place is cheaper than Halifax—Charlottetown, which sets the price for Prince Edward Island and quotes salt herring at 50 cents per dozen. Herring are expensive to the citizens of Regina, who have to pay \$1.00 per dozen, but the average price for the province, Saskatchewan, is as quoted above.

A three-masted schooner which arrived here several weeks ago with hard coal and ever since discharging has been waiting for a chance to get on the railway, left yesterday in tow of the tug Tussie for Lunenburg, her home port, where repairs will be effected.—Halifax Herald.

THE SEA CAPTAIN.—If there is one vocation in the world which has benefited on account of the war it is that of a sea captain, says an exchange. The amount of wages paid to sea captains today would, not very many years ago, have provided the ship with food and a complete crew. One Nova Scotia captain, who but ten years ago received not over eighty dollars per month, is now the recipient of three hundred dollars per month, with a bonus of two per cent. on freight. In Halifax lately \$80 a month was offered for seamen.

PEARSON-LEMOINE WEDDING.—Miss Muriel LeMoine, adopted daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Macdonald was married on Wednesday evening to Roy J. Pearson, says the Sydney Record. Rev. A. H. Campbell performed the ceremony, which took place at Falmouth street church. The church was beautifully decorated for the occasion and the bride in a taupe costume with rose hat and bridal bouquet made a pretty picture. Following the service at the church a reception was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Macdonald. Mr. and Mrs. Pearson after a trip to Charlottetown, will reside in Sydney.

## FORMER CHARLOTTETOWN BOY WINS SILVER CROSS

HALFAX, June 22.—The silver cross of the Boy Scouts is to be awarded to Temple Lane, the fourteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Lane, Cambridge street. On June 4 Temple saved the life of Gerald Lewin whom he brought unconscious from the waters of the North West Arm and by use of first aid methods learned as a scout, resuscitated. Gerald Lewin, eight years of age, was with some small companions on a raft near St. Mary's club house when he fell into deep water.

His companions cried brought Temple quickly to the spot. Without hesitation he dived in after the boy who had sunk for the second or third time. It required great exertion to get the unconscious boy ashore. In the boy scout drills Temple had learned the first aid principles for saving those who were nearly drowned, and these he at once put into effect and shortly had the satisfaction of having restored consciousness to the half-drowned boy.

Some men interested in the scout movement, heard of the brave act and yesterday a committee consisting of Messrs. J. T. Wilson, A. Archard and A. H. Rockling, Toronto. V. C. Timberley, took evidence regarding the incident, and have recommended that Temple be awarded the silver cross. The recommendation will go from the Provincial Council to the Canada General Council at Ottawa and from them to the chief scout, the Governor General, who has the power to award the cross.

Temple's brother, Driver L. S. Lane, is with the Canadian Engineers in France. (Temple Lane, referred to in the foregoing, is a former Charlottetown boy, his parents both having lived here until last September. His father, Mr. George Lane was for many years with the firm of Sanderson & Co., and later took up an agency work. Temple learned his boy scout first aid lessons in this city, and it goes to show what a valuable asset this knowledge is to
