Heredity? poof! It's good living For old sculler

LONDON May 27 (CP) — The old sculler has dealt harshly with Bossy Phelps, the sculling champion of the Thames. The King's Barge-master who once said "I look after my scullers as I look after my dogs," I don't depend on my anglers to do it for me," is serious about it.

Phelps' arman son Ted (E. A.), three times sculling champion of the world, is a prisoner of war. His other son Eric (E. L.), former British sculling champion, is interned in Germany. Rowing, the sport for which Bossy Phelps lives, has been abandoned for the duration. (Ted won the world's championship in 1930 and 1932, he also was defeated in Toronto in 1933.)

The father, Bossy—his initials are J. T.—is 65 and in his many years as a sculler, sculling coach and royal bargeman has known few days of illness. Three or four years ago a Eugenic Society report attributed his health and his profession to heredity. The Phelps have been watermen for more than 500 years and served royalty for a century.

Living Example

Bossy scoffed at the heredity theory, although later he appeared in a motion picture as one of its best examples.

"Heredity," he said, "I don't know anything about that. But I do know that without beer I shouldn't be as fit as I am today. Beer and sugar, best energy builders in the world."

Bossy rises regularly at seven and goes to bed at 10—at least he did before he was ill. He had only two meals a day—breakfast of fish, toast and tea, with much sugar—and lunch of steak or anything else available, provided there was plenty of it. Before he went to bed he had bread and cheese with a couple of pints of beer.

Bossy doesn't say so, but one of the reasons he is sick now may be because steaks are few and far between these days and tea, sugar and cheese are rationed. The things he likes best to eat are hardest to get.

Skills in Youth

A skilled boat-builder, Bossy has won his racing eight in the University race and the Grand Challenge Cup at Henley many times. He was a fine sculler in his youth and his knowledge of the Thames and of rowing brought him the appointment as pilot to the Oxford Cox—a job of teaching the crew how to steer the course from Putney to Mortlake.

His royal duties aren't burdensome for the Royal Barge hasn't been used since 1919. Built in 1689, the two-masted barge has been rowed over the Vauxhall course in 18 minutes, which Bossy called "practically good going," considering "un-ratified" crews took 20 minutes to row the 4-1/2 miles in their stream-lined eight.

Rowing and boats are easy to one who has no interest in other sports and a few years ago remarked that he had never been to a cricket or football match, tennis tournament or race meeting.

Detroit Wins Slugfest From Cleveland 9-6

NEW YORK, May 27 (AP)—Perhaps Cleveland Indians should try to get Bruce Campbell back again. Their old teammate lined two home runs today to give Detroit its second straight triumph over the American League-leading Tribesmen on their own lot.

The score was 9-6 and Bruce personally produced four of the Detroit tallies. Yesterday his ninth-inning double drove home two runs to break a deadlock and win for the Tigers.

Campbell's first four bagger—two of five produced during an afternoon of slugfests—was over League Park's right field screen as he led off the second inning. But he saved his noisiest punch for the Tigers' five-run rally in the seventh.

At Boston, Phil Rizzuto, young Canadian-born right-hander, pitched the best game of his short career in the big leagues, a three-hitter that gave Philadelphia Athletics an 11-1 victory over Red Sox

in the second game of a double-header. The A's lost the opener 5-2. Marchildon, making his fifth start of the season, got plenty of support from his teammates who combined three Boston hurlers for 12 hits, seven of them good for extra bases, he limited the Soxers to a double and two singles and had a shutout until the seventh when Jimmy Foxx walked, and went to third on a ruff of Joe Cronin's fly by Wally Moses and a single by Pete Fox. Fox scored on Skeeter Newsome's long fly.

Phil is a native of Penetanguishene, Ont.

At Washington, New York Yankees struggled to a 10-9 victory over Senators by an 18-hit offensive topped by Joe Dimaggio's home run and three singles.

At Chicago, St. Louis Browns, who usually play dead against the White Sox, rose up and defeated the Chicagoans, 5-2, behind rookie Bob Muncie's six-hit pitching.

Q.A.H.A. airs Disapproval With C.A.H.A.

MONTREAL, May 27 (CP)—The Quebec Amateur Hockey Association aired its disapproval between itself and the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association at a special meeting here tonight, and the outcome was a motion to form a new Eastern Canadian Amateur Hockey Association to comprise Quebec, Ottawa and the Maritimes.

The new setup, proposed by George Slater, President of the Quebec Senior Hockey League, has yet to be discussed with the Ottawa and Maritime groups, but a meeting is planned shortly to obtain the opinion of the two associations.

Apparently not satisfied with the playoff split by the C.A.H.A. to the Eastern Associations, the Quebec body felt that a radical move would have to be made to "let the world know that we are not satisfied with C.A.H.A. playoff conditions."

Slater said that the three Eastern Associations should play down between themselves, with proceeds from the playoffs remaining within the associations, then the C.A.H.A. could take over from there on as they do with the Ontario Hockey Associations.
