Crop Report

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with Crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

GENERAL.

Fine weather has prevailed during the past week in Alberta and in parts of Saskatchewan and threshing is general. Elsewhere on the Prairies there have been further rains. There will be much touch and sprouted grain but the extent of this will depend on future weather as probably not more than 40 per cent of the threshing has been completed. In Quebec the quality of the grain crops as a whole has been affected adversely by heavy rains during the harvesting operations. In Ontario dry weather during the past week has enabled most farmers to complete their grain harvesting. In the Maritime Provinces weather conditions for completing the harvest have been favourable and roots will be a good yield. In British Columbia the harvesting of all crops except late apples and roots is practically completed. Details follow:

PRAIRIE PROVINCES.

ALBERTA—WESTERN AREA— Following a week of generally fine weather cutting has been finished. Threshing while general is less than 10 per cent completed, grades averaging not better than 3 tough. **ALBERTA NORTHEASTERN AREA—** Threshing which has been more or less general during past week is 5 per cent to 25 per cent completed, grades averaging 3 tough. **ALBERTA SOUTHEASTERN AREA—** Threshing of small crop almost completed, grades averaging 2 straight. **SASKATCHEWAN NORTHERN AREA—** Owing to unfavorable weather threshing is proceeding slowly but is now about 50 per cent completed, wheat giving an average yield of about 17 bushels to the acre. There is very little No. 1 grain, the average grade being 3 or 4 with considerable percentage of tough wheat. **SASKATCHEWAN SOUTHERN AREA—** South, central and south-eastern districts have experienced much wet weather and not more than 25 per cent to 30 per cent of the crop has been threshed. In the remainder of the southern area somewhat better weather has prevailed and the crop is about 75 per cent threshed. Early threshed wheat has graded mostly 1 to 2 but much of the later returns will be Tough and of lower grade. **MANITOBA—** Bad weather has continued and little progress has been made. It is estimated that 30 per cent to 40 per cent is threshed. Grades have been materially lowered owing to sprouting.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC. Oats are plentiful but generally of fair quality only. In some districts they have been affected by rust or have had to be cut before being ripe. Corn is poor. The potato crop while promising to be above the average has been affected to some extent by rot. Other root crops are good. Tobacco is short in the leaf but of good quality. Grass pastures are holding out well.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO. The oat crop has been badly damaged by wet weather and will be 25 per cent below average. Corn harvesting is general, the crop is good. Root crops are good with the exception of turnips which are a failure. There is considerable rot in potatoes. Winter apples are scarce but fall apples are good. Grapes are heavy but are ripening slowly. Plums are plentiful and of good quality. Three quarters of the tobacco crop has been harvested but balance has been hit by frost and is of little value. Beans are a poor crop. Pastures are excellent.

MARITIME PROVINCES. In New Brunswick grains are below average but the potato crop is of excellent quality and average quantity. In Nova Scotia the apple crop will be of good quality though short. Hay and roots are average. In Prince Edward Island harvesting continues with all crops showing up well.


PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA. The potato crop is below average and sizing has been affected by the dry weather of the summer. There is no change in the estimated yield of apples which is somewhat above the average. Frosts have slightly affected onions and have considerably damaged tomato crops. The hop crop is a good average. Pastures are in good condition.


