FENIAN RAID VETERANS AS PENSION SEEKERS.

Some of the Provinces suffered from Fenian raids in 1866 and again Canada was called to defend her frontier against the same lawless miscreants in 1870. A small pension list grew out of the fact that some of the Canadian volunteers were killed or wounded in the skirmishes which took place, and more recently a medal was devised to be given to any who had taken part in the active defence of the country at those times. At the last session of the Canadian Parliament a bill was passed to provide for the payment of one hundred dollars to every person residing in Canada at this time who was regularly "enlisted in and served with the militia called out for active service in the year 1866 by the Governments of Canada, Nova Scotia or New Brunswick, or in 1870 by the Government of Canada."

Now the latest of these dates goes back forty-two years and the earlier date forty-six years, and it was to be reasonably supposed that the number of grizzled and spectacled veterans now surviving could not be very great. But lo! a host has arisen to claim the promised hundred. Reports are current that up to the present time more than fifteen thousand claims have been filed. One report, which is scarcely credible, has it that the claimants number twenty thousand. It would take a round million and a half to two millions to satisfy them all, but what is a million or so

when a great patriotic object is to be served?

Fifteen thousand veterans of the time of the Fenian raids! One is moved to ask how many thousands of Canada's citizen soldiers were called out at that time. Did they actually number fifteen thousand? And what a charmed life they must have borne, not only all to escape the Fenian bullets, but also all the fatal maladies that flesh is heir to during the forty-odd years since, in which the land has had peace. The country may rest assured, however, that the Hon. Colonel Sam Hughes will not pay quite all those claims without a searching inquiry into their validity. Still, it would be pleasing to think that fifteen or twenty thousand of the veterans were yet extant. Longevity speaks well for both the vigor of the Canadian people and the salubrity of the Canadian climate.

We Canadians have been a little disposed to laugh at our American cousins, who also had an "unpleasantness" in the sixties of last century, and are yet paying a round one hundred and fifty millions yearly in pensions to the surviving veterans and their dependants. Had Canada had a real war at that date we might, apparently, be now enjoying a life luxury. For after all, human nature is much the same on both sides of the boundary line, and nothing grows like a pension list when once it is established.

REVENUE AND TRADE.

Both the revenue and the external trade of Canada continue to expand at a rapid rate. For the month of May just closed the customs collections have broken all records for the month, being close upon nine millions of dollars, and \$2,500,000 more than in the corresponding month of last year. It is now confidently expected that the revenue from the customs during the current year will exceed \$100,000,000. These are big figures and go to show that the people of the Dominion are paying very close upon two million dollars a week for the privilege of bringing merchandise into the country.

Trade, too, is booming, especially on the import side. For the year ended with March last the total trade was \$862,699,832, which was nearly \$86,000,000 more than in the previous year. Alongside of the total imports, which were \$547,382,582, the export side seems rather disappointing. The total exports for the year amounted to \$315,317,250, of which only \$290,223,857 was the product of Canada. The balance of trade, whatever it may signify, was therefore very heavily against us. The rapid influx of immigrants, who do not produce much during their first year in the country, but whose wants must be supplied, no doubt accounts for both the expanded importations and for the adverse balance. Possibly, too, there may have been over-valuation. It is also to be observed that prices are now so high that the quantities of goods imported do not bear anything like the same proportion to value as in former years when prices were more moderate.

HOW TO PREVENT TREATING.

We pointed out some time ago that although neither of the political parties in Ontario has the courage to adopt prohibition of the liquor traffic, both of them find it necessary to make some further bid for the temperance vote. Mr. Rowell, who leads the Liberals, has laid down the plank, "Abolish the bars," and Sir James Whitney has met this advance by a proposal to abolish treating. And he has promised to bring in this measure at the next sitting of the Legislature. The Toronto World, which is in pretty close touch with Sir James, recently gave an outline of the methods by which it is proposed to effect the abolition.

Treating is to be made illegal under severe penalties, and these penalties will be directed against all the parties engaged in the transaction. The man who treats will be liable to these penalties, of course, and so will the man who accepts a treat, the hotel or saloon keeper in whose premises the treating is done, and the bartender who served the liquid. All are to be held equally guilty and when one of the quartette is punished all are to be punished.

Such a law if put into effect ought to stop treating, or at least make the practice a very expensive one. In the meantime discussion is going on as to whether abolishing the bars or abolishing treating would do more to promote sobriety and the general welfare. Closing the bars and at the same time permitting the sale by the bottle in the licensed shops, would be but a very partial remedy. Making treating illegal and still licensing both the bars and the shops to sell liquor, would be little better, if as good. Both are but halfway measures and come far short of the benefits that come from making the entire traffic illegal.

THE FOLLOWING WAS INADVERTENTLY OMITTED FROM YESTERDAY'S ISSUE.

BOSTON, May 29--Henry H. Butts, 40 years of age, a negro, who was Richeson's cellmate at the Charles Street Jail while the latter was waiting to be taken to the State Prison for electrocution, was sentenced to twelve or fourteen years in State Prison in the Suffolk Superior Criminal Court for shooting Robert Williamson on June 21, 1910, in Shawmut avenue. Butts was indicted for murder in the first degree but District Attorney Pelletier, after a thorough investigation of the case, accepted a plea of guilty of man slaughter.

Joseph A. Dennison made a plea for mercy before the sentence was imposed.

In imposing sentence Judge Crosby stated that he thought the defendant was fortunate when the government accepted a plea of manslaughter and remarked that it was in Butt's favor that he had saved the country cen-

Young Guitry has the poet's soul and began by admiring the exquisite and began by admiring the exquisite admiration of the other's talents ripened acquaintance into romance, although Guitry is very much the junior of the beautiful heroine.

TORONTO, May 28--The garden party given by the Duke of Cornwall, on the final day of his visit to Toronto, at Benvenuto yesterday, was marked by an accident that would have terminated an accident had the heroism of one of his Royal Highnesses officers and a policeman.

When the guests were arriving in their carriages, a team of horses at the top of avenue road hit became frightened and madly dashed down on the visitors. At the entrance to Benvenuto, the horses suddenly swerved, and throwing the two women occupants and the coachman to the ground, struck a passing street car.

The impact threw the vehicle against a private carriage, from which a lady guest was alighting. Both carriages were smashed and the lady and coachman buried in the wreckage.

The two runaway horses dashed among the numerous carriages nearby, but an officer of the Royal Household and a policeman pluckily seized the animals by the heads. The officer was slightly cut about the hands, before the horse he held, was subdued.

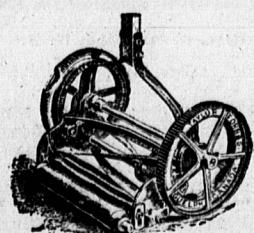
