**Sermon On Second Coming Of Christ**

Under the title of the sixth and seventh seals of the sixth and eighth chapters of Revelation another stirring discourse was delivered by Evangelist P. W. Johnston in the Brighton Club Room last night. The various events predicted to transpire as presented by the revelator in Rev. 6: 12-17 were dealt with by the evangelist, and he stated that we are now living in the time when the events of this prophecy were nearly all fulfilled. He gave historical data to show the fulfillment of the great earthquake that marked the beginning of the sixth seal and also the signs in the sun, the moon and the stars, which followed. All these events are now in the past, said Mr. Johnston, and as these things were predicted as signs of the coming of Christ the second time we may therefore reasonably expect that Christ is very near even though we do not know the day nor the hour.

But these celestial signs, said Mr. Johnston, are not the only ones that foretell the second coming of Christ. He referred to the strife between capital and labor, that is spoken of by the prophet James in chapter 5: 1-5, also the perils of the latter days as fore-shadowed in 2 Tim. 3: 1-5. These signs, said Mr. Johnston, have always been in existence as far as the wicked professing world is concerned, but the reason that these signs are regarded as a peril in these latter days, he said, is because these signs are found in the church. He said there was little or no difference nowadays between the professedly christian church and the wicked world. All kinds of sins were now tolerated in the so called church of Christ, that the standard set by Christ for Christians is now being lowered and religion is becoming easy. The true religion of Christ however is not one of ease and self gratification. The Lord has not made any compromise of the principles of Christian living even though the human race may be weaker. God is still maintaining the standard and people are not left without sufficient power to enable to come up to high calling of God in Christ Jesus.

Besides these social and religious signs the evangelist referred to the great national signs when the Master said in His great prophecy in Matt. 24: 7, 8, that "nation would rise against nation and kingdom against kingdom." These very things, he said, are being fulfilled before our very eyes. Nor will the world be any better as we draw near the end; for as he read in 2 Tim. 3: 13, that "evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived." He spoke of the latter day scoffers who in the time before Christ's coming would be ridiculing the second coming of Christ and the signs as is expressed by the great apostle Peter in Chapter 3: 3, 4, "Where is the promise of his coming? For since the fathers fell asleep all things continue the same as from the beginning." Even these scoffers, he said were a sign in themselves of the near approach of Christ.

The evangelist then closed his lecture by briefly showing the events of the seventh seal how that there would be silence in heaven for the period here mentioned because of the angels leaving heaven for the purpose of gathering the people of God from the earth in connection with the second coming of Christ. He said this is another proof that people do not go to heaven at death for the angels come to get them only at the time of Christ's second coming. He urged his hearers to be prepared for what he regarded as an event that is to transpire in the very near future.

Along with that she could always find time to respond to the call of others, and wherever sickness or death was to be found she too was mostly there.

Blessed with an unusually vigorous constitution, she made almost impossible demands upon it, and so a couple of years ago it broke beneath the strain. One stroke followed another till, about six months before her death, one of unusual severity made her a complete invalid. From then till the end she gradually weakened, apparently passing away without being aware of the change.

Death has its fears for most. But

with her there was no fear. She was much like the old woman, described by Ian MacLaren, who was afraid to go to Edinburgh because she had to pass through a tunnel before reaching her destination. But as she drew near the tunnel she fell asleep, and on waking found herself in the glorious sunshine beyond. We believe it was much the same with her.

The funeral was held on the following Saturday and, although the afternoon brought a downpour of rain, a large number of friends and neighbours gathered to pay their last tribute of respect.
