Chaplin Mixed Up In Political Discussion

BERLIN March 17—Charlie Chaplin finds himself unwillingly enmeshed in German political discussion.

The "Young Guard" Communist youth organ, quoted the movie actor as declaring to its editor: "my greetings and all my sympathies are with the Communist youth of Germany."

The Conservative Nationalist Boerszeitung asserted that if the remark were true it constituted an unwarranted meddling with Germany's internal affairs.

Chaplin's secretary said that he believed the incident to have arisen from the visit of a delegation representing German unemployment in the stage and film fields. The actor expressed profound sympathy with their lot but pointed out that 190,000 United States film people were also unemployed.

"The word 'Communism' was never mentioned," the secretary said. "Charlie is no politician and never expresses political opinions."

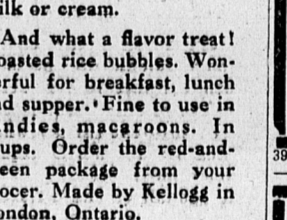
