Icebreaker Limp Into Port

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, March 11-Ending a long battle with ice that snapped off four of her propeller blades, the Canadian Government Steamer Montcalm limped into Halifax tonight for repairs after having completed an errand of mercy. Leaving North Sydney on Feb. 19, the powerful vessel started her hazardous journey up the Cape Breton coast to land supplies for starving fisherfolk who had been isolated by snow on land and ice at sea. Then she continued northward to lonely St. Paul's Island, off the tip of Cape Breton, where she landed supplies and picked up Mrs. McLeellan, wife of the east end lightkeeper, who was ill and requiring hospital treatment.

First Reading Canada-France Trade Treaty

OTTAWA, March 11-First reading was given in the House of Commons today to a bill ratifying the supplementary Canada-France trade agreement of 1933, on motion of Sir George Perley, acting leader of the government. The measure formally approves an additional protocol to the existing trade agreement negotiated by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett in Paris last September and effective as from Oct. 1, 1934.
