Ralph, South African heavyweight king, in six rounds, Nov. 6, 1948, and was flatted himself by Bruce Woodcock, the European heavyweight champion, in 14 rounds in London last June.
Maxim has had four fights since last May, winning all. He out-pointed Lesnevich, stopped Joe Kahut and Pat McCafferty and defeated Bill Peterson. There is strong newspaper opinion that Mills will win by a knockout. Of seven London boxing writers who have made predictions, five pick Mills to win on a knockout. Only one of the five suggests that Mills will stand a chance if the fight goes all the way. Two of the seven select Maxim to win and predict the fight will go 15 rounds. Both fighters wound up their training in excellent shape. Mills said he figured to scale 174 — a pound under the light heavyweight limit — while Maxim said he would weigh 174 1-2. With the indoor arena already sold out, the bout figures to gross about \$65,000. Mills will get 25 per cent of the gross and Maxim 20 per cent.

—PRECEDATION to the men with whom he had served so many years. 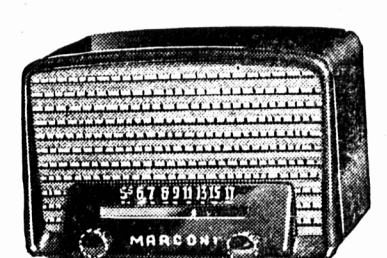

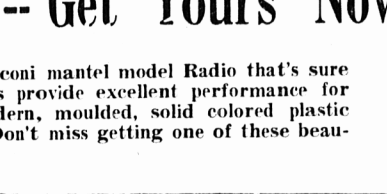
