"THE CALL FOR HELP."

Again the West appeals to the East for help to assist in harvesting the great crops of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

According to reliable reports, the crop this year, taking into consideration the increased acreage under cultivation, will be considerably greater than in any previous year, the wheat crop alone being estimated at 140,000,000 bushels, and to successfully harvest thousands upon thousands of Farm Helpers are required.

The West can supply but a very small percentage of the number necessary, and consequently the Western Farmers are obliged to appeal to the East for assistance in order to save the crops, which require to be harvested within a certain period of time.

The Canadian Pacific Railway, realizing the demand for labor in the West, will, as in previous years, run Farm Laborers Excursions, and it is expected the laborers from the Maritime Provinces will be required to leave early in August. The exact date will be announced later, and the general arrangements will be in line with those in effect in connection with excursions run in previous years.

The work of harvesting will give months of steady employment to a vast army of laborers; and when the appeal for help comes, it is earnestly hoped that the Maritime Province will respond in large numbers as heretofore. Thousands of Farmers from the Provinces are now located in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, and they will gladly welcome those from the East, who will go to their assistance. The passage rate is so low that it is almost equal to free transportation. It makes a

splendid vacation trip and affords a good opportunity to see the West at its best. Even by working part-time only, sufficient can be earned to pay the expenses of the trip, and the passengers can return home with their vacation money in pocket.

EASY LIFE OF A REGICIDE.

Luccheni, Who Killed Empress of Austria in 1898, is Leading a Luxurious Life in Swiss Prison.

LONDON, July 26—It has often been stated that Luigi Luccheni, the man who murdered the Empress Elizabeth in prison in 1898, had either died from the effects of the severities to which he was subjected, or was hopelessly insane and chained in a dungeon. Harry De Windt of the Daily Express contributes to that paper the result of a visit made to the assassin on Wednesday, showing that the prisoner is leading an enjoyable, almost a luxurious life in the old prison of Geneva, known as L'Eveche. He is in excellent health. It was as a delegate to the Paris Penal Congress that De Windt was allowed to talk with Luccheni, who has seen no one since his imprisonment for years. De Windt found him in a light, airy ward, overlooking the lake. He is employed at bookbinding, but this is voluntary as he need not work unless he is so disposed. He was cheerfully and amicably chatting with other convicts.

He has never been in a dark cell except for three short periods for refractory conduct, one of which was a recent attempt to stab the governor of the prison with a weapon he has secretly fashioned from a sardine can. He told De Windt he was extremely well. He has an abundant diet, a pint of wine and four cigarettes daily.

De Windt described him as a tall, dark faced, sturdy little man, with dark restless eyes and a perpetual sinister smile. He constantly feigns insanity, but succeeds poorly. His intelligence is above the average. He reads much, especially the works of Montesquieu, Rousseau and Dickens. He has a large cell, a comfortable bed, a writing table, a well filled bookcase and electric light. The walls of his cell are covered with picture postcards, including portraits of European sovereigns, notably the Kings of England Spain and Italy. De Windt was astonished to find among these portraits those of the Emperor Francis Joseph and of the Empress Elizabeth.

These had not been noticed by the governor of the prison, who when De Windt called his attention to them tore them down and destroyed them.

De Windt raised the question whether the brutal, senseless slayer is being adequately punished.

TOO HOT TO WORK.

Some of the old members of cow testing associations appreciate the system very much, and are realizing a profit by it. In the Shearer, Ont., association, for instance, one man states that he has delivered to the factory almost as much milk from ten cows as he did two years ago from forty-two cows. He has sold one of the ten for \$45.00 for beef. At her best she gave 31 lbs. of milk per day; she is replaced by a cow costing \$30.00, now giving 41 lbs. of milk per day.

This statement shows the immense saving of labor that can be effected by keeping cows selected on their records. It is too hot to work round and bother with four unnecessary cows if the smaller herd, as indicated above, brings as good a return. If it pays to milk a cow it pays to milk a good one. The herd needs pruning of the dead, unprofitable wood. Dairy records of individual cows show conclusively which to lop off. Blank forms are supplied free of charge on application to the Dairy Commissioner, Ottawa.
