Islander Killed in Fall From Roof

The following appears in a Vancouver paper: John Stewart, carpenter, 575 Fifty-third avenue east, who was injured last Friday morning (April 30th) when he fell from a roof he was working on, died at 2.30 a. m. at St. Paul's Hospital.

Stewart was working on the top of the home of Mr. C. S. Mahars, superintendent of the C. P. R., 125 Eleventh avenue west when he slipped and fell. He was rushed to the hospital in Kearney's ambulance and was found to be suffering from an injured back and thigh. His condition was reported as fair until Monday evening when complications set in and he died.

The remains have been removed to the city morgue, where an inquest will be held. The late Mr. Stewart whose death occurred on May 4th, was the son of the late James B. Stewart of Roseneath, P. E. I. He has been working in British Columbia for considerable time, having been in the employ of the C. P. R. for over twenty years.

He leaves to mourn a widow, (nee Edith MacDonald of East Port) also two sons in Vancouver one brother William and one sister, Elsie, wife of Norman Stewart, in Vancouver, one brother Lemuel and one sister, Mrs. Campbell, in the home at Roseneath and a sister Elizabeth in Boston and a sister Mrs. G. H. Nelson of Montague.

Mr. Stewart was in the very prime of life and a man of splendid character. His death will be greatly deplored by a wide circle of friends in this Province.

Gopher Tails in Imperial Valley Worth Dime Each

EL CENTRO, Cal., May 16. — A new use for gopher tails, in which gophers have no interest, has been found in the Imperial Valley. The tails are becoming legal tender in many valley towns where a bounty of ten cents a tail is paid by the county horticultural commission.

One man, a storekeeper near High Line, brought in 235 tails in one bundle. He said he had taken them in trade over his counter. Since the gopher extermination campaign began in the valley last June, more than 250,000 gophers have been killed and the "scalps" presented for cash.

Lauds Those Who Worked to Issue Gov't. Paper

LONDON, May 16. —The Morning Post contains a long account of the bringing into being of the British Gazette, the government official paper published during the general strike.

From the Post's article it appears that the members of the Gazette editorial staff, were given the chief workers toiled for 72 hours at a stretch with snatches of sleep barely sufficient to keep them going.

Editorially the Post pays tribute to Lord Beaverbrook and Lord Rothermere for assistance in the strike as well as to Winston Churchill, Chancellor of the Exchequer who was the editorial chief of the Gazette.

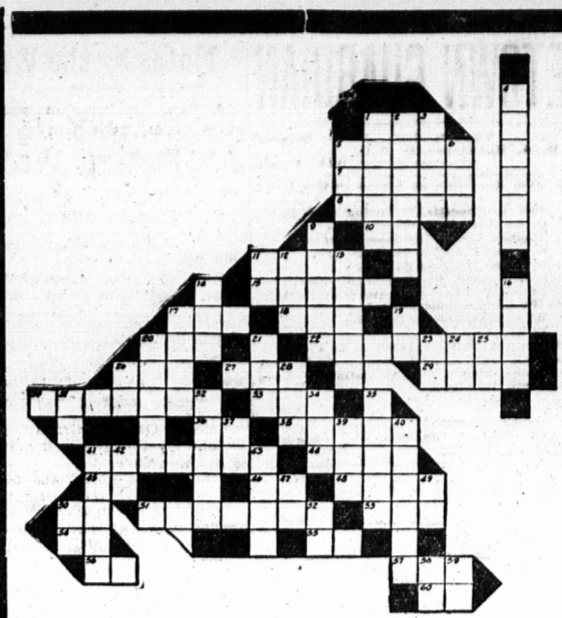
"We have not in the Morning Post been used to belauding Lord Beaverbrook or overmuch to flatter Mr. Churchill," the Post says, "but it is proper that we should pay tribute to the courage, energy and high personal honor of Mr. Churchill which made all things possible and to the unstinted and uncalculating aid which Lord Beaverbrook and Lord Rothermere gave to those whose duty it became to bring to birth the British Gazette."

Questions will be asked in parliament next week as to the cost of producing the British Gazette, how much revenue was derived from advertisements in the temporary journal, and what compensation is payable to the Morning Post in connection with the Gazette.

A writer in the Times protests against the undignified boasting in the Gazette of its daily rising circulation. The writer says he found two copies of the British Gazette in his letter box without his having requested any copies of the official paper.
