Annual Meeting Of Souris Red Cross

Following is the address given at the Annual Meeting of the Souris Red Cross by the President Mrs. J. W. Brennan.

Again we are at the end of a year's work of our local Red Cross. On Nov. 9th 1939 just four years ago, the Souris Branch of the Red Cross was formed. Mrs. Peter Holland was our first President taking office for one year. Mrs. Holland was followed by Mrs. A. C. Cox who held office for two years. At our last Annual Meeting, Mrs. Adrian McInnis was elected President but Mrs. McInnis resigned after the first meeting. I was then elected and since that time have filled the office conscientiously and to the best of my ability.

Let me here thank the officers and members for their splendid cooperation in all our work during my term of office.

Our officers reports will show the amount of work this small band have accomplished during the year. We have held two successful pantry sales to raise funds for our good work and received proceeds of \$1,300.00 for the Red Cross drive through the local chairman Mr. Arthur McQuaid.

Let me here also due the ladies of Souris River and Red Pt. through the C. W. L. for work on the Red Cross drive. We have held 37 meetings during the year with an average of ten in attendance.

The following articles have been sent to Headquarters at Charlottetown— 562 Hospital Dressings; 40 Suits Pyjamas, 21 Girls Dresses, 19 Boys Suits, 5 Baby Dresses, 6 Large Quilts, 3 Baby Quilts, 2 Pillow Cases, 1 Blanket, 18 Bed Covers, 50 Personal Property Bags, 13 Aero Caps, 13 prs. Gloves, 10 Helmetts, 5 Helmet Caps, 5 pr. Mitts, 24 prs. Army Sox, 12 prs. Seaman's Lower Stockings, 24 prs. Seaman's 18" Sox, 4 prs. Children's Stockings, 2 Boys Suits, 4 Boys Coat Sweaters, 12 Low Sleeves, Turtle Neck Sweaters, 6 Long Sleeve High Neck Sweaters, 1 Women's Long Sleeve Sweater, 1 Airforce Sleeveless Sweater, 9 Tuck-ins, 1 pr. Wristlets, 1 Afghan and \$413.99 in cheques. Of this amount \$182.82 was received from the Carry On Canada of Eastern Kings, the proceeds from a car of salvage collected and loaded through the efforts of the citizens of the districts East of Souris. Another cheque of \$73.63 was also received from the Eastern Kings Carry On Canada Corps, the proceeds from sale of salvage. We received the proceeds of a Benefit Sports and Skate given by the Rink Managers Messrs. Jas. Brennan and Angus Lavie. Two successful pantry sales were held during the year and we solicited donations from the merchants for the Rotary Auction Sale in aid of Grippled Children.

Besides the local donations of money, quilts, etc. and work done through the C. W. L. we have received and appreciated work from Souris River and donations of several quilts from Red Point through the C. W. L. also a blanket from Mrs. Wm. Neale of Bear River and work done for us through the Bear River Institute.

No Drastic Changes In Radios

"The listening public should not expect too much after the war in the way of changes in radio receiver design," was the warning issued by the Radio Manufacturers Association of Canada at a recent meeting. When civilian production is resumed the first new radios will likely be quite similar to the home receivers now produced.

The radio industry today is totally absorbed in the war effort. All of its research and engineering talents is devoted to experimenting and perfecting communication systems and detecting devices for use by the armed forces.

The existing chassis designs of household receiving sets cannot be changed at present as they are frozen by the government. Not until all war requirements have been fully met by the radio industry will its engineers be in a position to apply wartime discoveries and advancements to radios for home consumption.

While as a result of research, accelerated by war, many new radio devices will be produced, no big change in radio design is foreseen for some time. Before some of the new developments can be utilized in home radio sets present broadcasting facilities will have to be greatly extended. Broadcast techniques, too, will have to undergo changes. It is expected these advancements will be made gradually and the public will realize them only over a period of years.



How To Make Good Cakes, With Less Butter, Sugar, Eggs

Orange Syrup Cake

flavor the One-Egg Wonder Cake with 1 teaspoon grated orange rind. After baking, let cake cool 1/2 hour. Mix together 1/2 cup orange juice and 1/2 cup sugar, and spread on cake at intervals, 1 or 2 tablespoons at a time until all of syrup is used.

Mix One-Egg Wonder Cake. Divide batter in halves and make the two variations listed below. These can be baked in greased cup cake pans or in any 8 x 8 x 2 inch pan for cutting into squares. In either case, bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 18 minutes.

Chocolate Cakes. Melt 1 square Baker's Unsweetened Chocolate. Add to half batter; turn into greased pans; top with nuts.

Spice Cakes. Add 1 tablespoon molasses, 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon mace, and 1/4 cup chopped raisins to half of batter. Blend.

One-Egg Wonder Cake

2 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour
2 teaspoons Calumet Baking Powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg, unbeaten
3/4 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, and cream together well. Add egg and beat very thoroughly. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla. Bake in two greased 8 inch layer pans in moderate oven (370°F.) 20 to 25 minutes.

To Save Sugar

Substitute corn syrup or honey for half the sugar. Use 1/2 cup sugar and 1/2 cup syrup. Decrease the milk by 3 tablespoons.

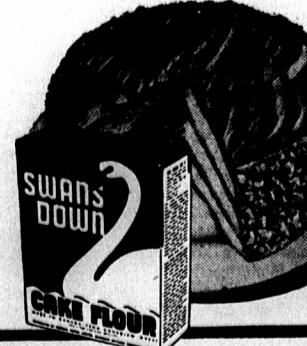
