A NUMBER of harvesters returned from the West Saturday night.

PATRICK MONAGHAN, deranged, was remanded at Police Court Saturday and sent to Falconwood in the afternoon.

JUST four weeks until Christmas. As it falls on Sunday specially prepared music will be given in our city churches on that day.

THE death took place in Everett Nov. 18 of Mrs. Agnes Melanson (nee Grinnell), wife of Joseph Melanson, aged 28 years, a native of Prince Edward Island.

THE regular quarterly meeting of the Order of Railway Telegraphers was held in the city Saturday evening. There was no other than routine business.

PARTIES in Fredericton, N. B., are shipping four thousand Christmas Trees to New York. They range from two to twenty feet in height and the price from twenty cents up.

SEYMOUR Gregory who has been foreman of clay work on Hill shore Bridge Construction has resigned and leaves shortly for New York where he will spend the winter.

ANOTHER cargo of produce arrived from P. E. Island Friday by the schooner Midnight. She brought 2800 bushels of potatoes and 232 bushels of turnips.—Halifax Chronicle.

THE Fourth Regiment C. A. contemplate holding a card party and dance in the new Market Hall in the near future. The affair if it materializes will be one of the fashionable events of the season.

AT the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon the President W. S. Louson delivered an able and interesting address on Harnessing Forces to a good audience. Excellent music was furnished by the 4th Regiment male quartet.

REV. DR. GATES, St. John, chairman of the committee on Baptist union, says that up to the present time 121 churches in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island had passed unanimous resolutions in favor of the scheme.

No spot in Europe has greater attractions for the tourist or is richer in historical recollections than the ruins of the Eternal City. The splendid views to be exhibited in St. James Hall on Tuesday evening are well worth seeing.

E. R. BURPER, the millionaire business man of Bangor, Me., whose death was announced in The Guardian Saturday, with Collingwood Schrieber, now Deputy Minister of Railways, built by contract the whole of P. E. I. Railway.

Miss Minnie Wright, Summerside is visiting friends in the city.

THE steamer Wasia arrived yesterday afternoon with 500 tons of Old Sydney Run of Mine Coal to C. Lyons & Co.

THE Lunenburg left yesterday evening at 8 o'clock for Georgetown taking in tow the dredge Prince Edward which will deepen the harbor there for the winter steamers.

THE death is announced in Colorado, Springs, Col., of Angus Macdonald, formerly of Salem, Mass. He was born at Springton, P. E. I., in 1856, and learned the tailoring business on the Island before coming to this state. He was a prominent Mason, having been a member of a Royal Arch Chapter in New Brunswick.

THE death took place at Brackley Point on Saturday from slow fever of William Clark a popular young man in the prime of manhood. A few weeks ago he was taken ill and despite medical aid he passed away Saturday forenoon. He was a member of the Light Horse and his funeral will be with military honors.

JIMMIE MICHAEL, the noted Welsh middle distance bicycle rider, died suddenly last Monday morning on board the French line steamer La Saveie, of congestion of the brain. Michael was coming to the United States to race again and was accompanied by a number of long distance riders who were to enter the six day contest to be held there soon. Michael complained of being ill on Sunday, saying to the ship's doctor that he was suffering from a very severe headache and nausea. He died in the afternoon.

THE Maritime Farmer speaking of the well known Maritime Yorkshire breeder, J. W. Callbeck, late of Augustine Cove, says the reason for his selling a part of the stock is the proprietor's removal to a new farm at Summerside whereas yet he has not sufficient accommodation for his present extensive herd but where, once stabling is provided, he expects to be better situated than ever to carry on his business. Of Mr. Callbeck's stock favorable mention has often been made and purchasers may rely upon good pigs and, what is more, fair dealing.

THE channel over the bar at the entrance to New London harbor, P. E. I., has again shifted, so that the best water is now in the alignment of the old range-rocket front range and main coast lights. The back range light, established in 1863 (see notice to mariners No. 52 (28) of 1903), shown from a lantern hoisted on a pole situated 1019 feet S. 18 degrees west from the front light, has therefore been discontinued and the channel over the bar is now marked by the front white light in one with the main red light, which is situated 1,500 feet S.W. from it. Captain P. G. Johnson, D. G. S. Lady Laurier, reports having found an uncharted rock 2 cable N 79 degrees W from Arisaig lighthouse on the Northumberland Strait coast of Nova Scotia. Lat. N. 45.45.43. Lon. W 62.10.25. The rock is described as a pinnacle, with seven feet water on it, and from 25 to 30 feet water around it.

THE Church Guardian, published at Toronto, the leading Methodist publication in Canada, in its Thanksgiving issue says: "Rev. Dr. Heartz was called to Charlottetown early in the month on account of the illness of his mother. Latest reports indicate an improvement in her health. Dr. Heartz, although most of his honorable and useful ministry has been spent in the Nova Scotia Conference, is a native of Prince Edward Island. He has just received a hearty and unanimous invitation to the pastorate of the Centenary Church, St. John, to take effect after next Conference. He feels compelled to refuse such an opening for usefulness, because of his intention not to take a pastoral charge after this year. There are other ways in which he hopes to serve the church, to which he has devoted a long and successful ministry." The many friends of Dr. Heartz will want to congratulate him upon the call, though he will not accept it.

THE C. B. C. Debating Society held its sixth meeting on Saturday evening. Mr. Clark resigned his office of Secretary much to the regret of the members. Miss Bolger was elected to succeed him. The subject was, "From which do we in Canada derive the greater pleasure, winter or summer sports." In a concise speech Mr. Clark extolled the pleasure and enjoyment to be derived by following up the various amusements carried on in winter, while Mr. Butler endeavored to sustain arguments in favor of the summer sports. The debate was at times quite interesting and well prevailed on all sides. There were quite a number of new speakers, a good indication that the interest is increasing. W. Clarke was supported by Messrs. Brebant and Bowness, Miss Wright and Miss Essory. Mr. Trainor and Mr. Gaudet were followers of the opposition. The ballot resulted in a tie. The chairman gave the casting vote in favor of the winter.
