SQUATTERS MUST LEAVE RESERVES

OTTAWA, May 27.—Arrangements are being made to clear all squatters off the Dominion forest reserves in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and the railway belt of British Columbia. There are twenty-one of these reserves covering a total area of 3,300 square miles. There can be no security from fire as long as people are living in the timber.

The mounted police will serve notice on all parties who have no title to leave and go to lands, which are open for settlement. There are several hundreds of these squatters. A beginning is being made toward the organization of a permanent staff of rangers for all the reserves to prevent fires and timber poaching. A survey of the timber is being carried out and as soon as it is completed a plan will be devised by which the annual growth may be taken off and marketed.

HALIFAX SHIP LABORERS REFUSE

HALIFAX, May 27.—The longshoremen's strike is on in full force today. Victor Luburlet, of the department of labor, offered his services to the shipping men as mediator between them and the strikers. This was accepted. He was then authorized to offer the men an advance of 2 cents an hour. In the meantime William Roche, M. P., and Michael Carney, M. P., asked the men to submit their case to arbitration under the Lemieux bill. Roche saying that for his own part he was ready to pay the full five cents advance. They declined this, however, and also declined to accept the shipping men's offer of half their demand.

Pickford & Black expressed a willingness to pay the five cents to finish the work on the Olen's but the men would not accept this without any agreement to pay the increase for the whole year.

The steamer Halifax, from Boston, on account of the strike, was unable to proceed to Charlottetown and forwarded her passengers by rail. The shipping companies say they will be able to get her ready to return to Boston on Wednesday night.
