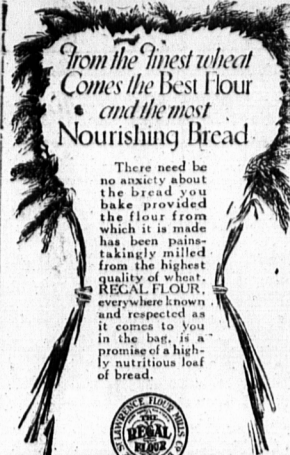

A TOY BOAT FOR THE HOLIDAYS.

The model sailing boat shown in Fig. 1 can be made without technical knowledge by any handy amateur. It has the advantage of being light and is admirably adapted for sailing on the sea.

The boat may be made any length in the reason according to personal preference but a model about 24 ins. long is large enough for most boys. Suppose this size is adopted, the hull will measure 24 ins. long 7 1/2 ins. wide and 6 1/2 ins. deep from deck to keel.

First enlarge the diagram Fig. 2 to the desired length, in this case 24 ins., and then cut two pieces of thin wood such as 1/8 inch fretwood, to the shape, A in Fig. 2.

Next cut pieces of wood to the shapes shown at B, C, D, in Fig. 3 and at E in Fig. 5. These of course are enlarged to the same scale as the other drawing, and form bulkheads or partitions across the hull. They are shown in the upper half of Fig. 4 in their places in the hull and are there marked B, C, D, E.

When the two side pieces and the four cross pieces have been shaped and the edges smoothed with sandpaper, they are put together as shown in Fig. 6 by gluing and nailing the side pieces to the cross pieces.

The next thing is to pull the ends of the side pieces together at the front, or bows, and hold them temporarily with a binding or string. Then cut a piece of wood

about 1 in. thick and shape it to a vee shape to fit between the side pieces as shown in Fig. 4 at F. Insert and fix the cross pieces C and E and close up the bows of front part and glue and screw the sides to the vee shaped block. The boat will now appear as in Fig. 6 but without the floor or bottom piece.

Give the whole of the inside of the hull a coat or two of good paint and then cut a small square piece of wood as shown at G in Fig. 4 and fix it to the bottom of the boat at the point shown. Before doing this drill a hole through the middle of the block for the post or lower part of the mast making the hole 3/8 in. diameter for a 2 1/2 in. boat 1 1/2 in. for a 30 in. boat and 3/4 in. for larger boats.

The next proceeding is to cut another piece of thin wood for the deck and to fit it in place as before taking the greatest care to make a perfectly watertight joint everywhere. It is found difficult the best thing is to give the hull a coat of ordinary varnish and to cover it all over immediately with Jap-sik pressing it into place on the wet varnish. Make little snips in the material wherever necessary to make it lay perfectly flat and in firm contact with the wood. Brush the varnish well into and over the silk and the latter will become transparent and almost invisible. When the varnish is perfectly dry rub the hull down with sandpaper and paint or varnish it in any desired colour. The keel shown in Fig. 7 is cut to shape from stout zinc, which can be done with a pair of tin snips, or the ironmongers will do it for a few pence.

Fix two upright rods about 4 ins. long as shown in Fig. 7 at A and B and screw their upper ends and provide a nut and washer. The rods should be about 1/8 diameter and the lower part flattened and riveted to the zinc plate. The rudder in Fig. 7 is similarly made and freely hinged to the keel with two wire rings as shown. Holes are then drilled through the hull to allow the rods to pass the keel being held in place by the nuts and made watertight with rubber washers.

Place the hull in a bath of water and place weights on it until the hull floats at the level of the line in the middle of Fig. 2, and attach this weight of lead to the lower part of the keel as shown dotted in Fig. 7. Add an ounce or two to the end of the rudder as also

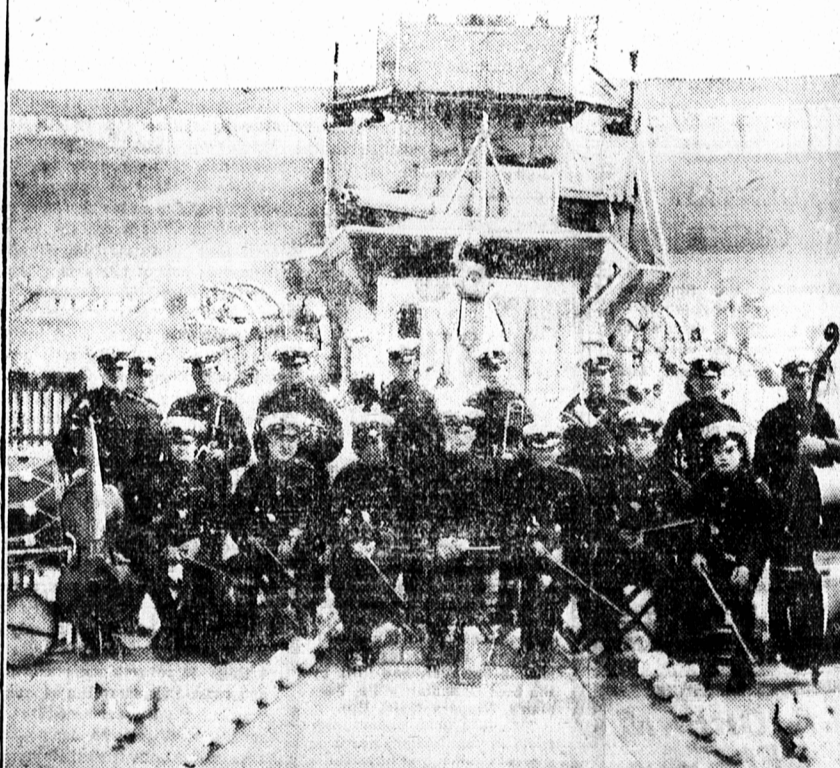
SCOTTISH FARMERS SUFFER FROM RAINS

TORONTO, Sept. 14. - Scottish as well as Ontario farmers have had to stand idle at harvest time and see their crops spoiling from continuous rains. Since the unusual weather appears to have been world-wide there may be something to the theory put forth by Paul Painleve, French statesman and an eminent scientist, that radio broadcasting is responsible. The ether waves, according to M. Painleve, are instrumental in condensing moisture with resultant torrential rains; which have been so common this summer on this continent and in Europe.

Broadcast From War Ship Is Novel C.N.R.M. Feature



Tradition in the British Navy harks back to Nelson and a great many features of daily routine on board ship date from the time of the famous Admiral. However, the navy is at all times equally ready to establish precedent and the Commander-in-Chief of the North America and West Indies Squadron, Vice Admiral Sir Walter Cowan, Bart., K.C.B., D.S.O., M.V.O., has given permission for an event of absolutely novel character, nothing less than a radio broadcast from the deck of a warship. The broadcast will take place on the night of Thursday, September 16, on board His Majesty's Ship Calcutta, moored in the Port of Montreal, when special programme will be played by the Royal Marine Band. The transmission will be effected through CNRM, which on this occasion will be tied in with CNRO, giving to the most populous section of North America the opportunity of listening-in to a most unusual broadcast.
