## BRUINS OUST RANGERS IN OVERTIME 2-1

### Mel Hill Again Hero Scoring His Third Sudden Death Goal Of Series

(By Bill King, Associated Press Staff Writer) BOSTON, April 3—(Monday)—Handy Mell Hill caged his third sudden death goal in the seven-game series against the New York Rangers early today to give the Boston Bruins a 2-1 victory and put them in the Stanley Cup finals against the Toronto Maple Leafs. The winning tally was scored during the eighth minute of play in the third overtime period.

As was the case in the two previous marathon games he decided, Hill was assisted by Bill Cowley, the veteran centre. The teams had battled a second or so less than 108 minutes when Roy Conacher started the winning rush by carrying into Ranger territory.

Once over the line that winger fired into the right corner of the backboards and Cowley out-fought Art Coulter and Muzz Patrick, the Ranger secondaries, to gain possession of the rubber. He angled the puck to centre and the speeding Hill gained it 20 feet from the net and forehanded it through the right corner of sub-goalie Bert Gardiner's cage. The deadlock had lasted for more than 70 minutes of play for both teams scored within two minutes of each other in the second regular period. Ray Gettiffe, Boston left winger who has seen but little action in this series, opened the tallying by ramming in Gordon Pettinger's pass from the crease, only to have Muzz Patrick nullify that tally with a 50-foot scoring shot less than two minutes later.

The slender Hill, a 23-year-oldster playing his second season with the Bruins wound up the opening game in New York after 119 minutes of play and he gave the Bruins their second triumph, after 8:24 of sudden death play, when the National Hockey League champions and their runners-up put on the first Boston play action.

### Penalties Prove Costly As Rangers Beat Bruins

(By DON GILLBERT Canadian Press Staff Writer) NEW YORK, April 2—A pair of goals while the Bruins were short-handed hoisted New York Rangers to a 3-1 victory in Madison Square Garden Saturday night and sent series "A" of the Stanley Cup hockey playoffs back to Boston for a seventh and decisive game to-night.

Rangers' third consecutive triumph over the National Hockey League champions, tying the best-of-seven games series at three games apiece, was clinched in the first 10 minutes of the third period when Mel Hill, hero of Boston's two sudden-death wins before the New Yorkers hit their stride, and Eddie Shore, Bruins' defence star, drew penalties in quick succession.

The count was tied 1-1 when Hill was chased for interference and Rangers turned on the heat. Art Coulter, captain of the Rangers, started the play for the first goal, passing to Clint Smith who passed out to Bill Carse, winger brought up from Philadelphia Ramblers of the International-American League to replace injured Cecil Dillon. The rookie aimed a perfect shot past goalie Frank Brimsek into the far corner of the net.

Hill no sooner returned than Shore, to the frenzied mood of the crowd of 16,630, was banished for slashing. The Rangers returned to their five-man attack and in the 10th minute of the period the Colville brothers, Mac and Ned, set up the puck for Alex Shibicky, who beat Brimsek with a carefully-aimed shot from 20 feet out.

### Goodyears Win Opener From Royals

(By ROBERT CLARKE Montreal, April 2—(CP)—Toronto Goodyears took full advantage of opposition penalties to day to start a best-of-five game series with Montreal Royals for the Eastern Canada senior amateur hockey title with a 6-2 victory. A paid admission of 12,100 fans—the largest crowd to see a hockey game in Montreal in several seasons—washed the Goodyears, championing the Ontario Hockey Association, put an end to a Royals' streak of 17 straight victories. The Goodyears themselves have been unbeaten this season, winning 26 and drawing five in 31 starts.

The teams play the second game of the series Tuesday night in Toronto, returning to Montreal for the third game Thursday. Should a fourth game be necessary it will be played at Toronto next Saturday night. No provisions have been made yet if the teams need a fifth game to decide which club will represent the section in the final for the Allan Cup, won last year by Trail Smoke Eaters.

Penalties: O'Flaherty, Don Metz and Johnny Inglis shared scoring honors as the Goodyears tallied two in the first period, one in the second and three in the third. Both Royals goals came in the middle chapter, with Pete Morin and Carl Gamble getting the scores.

### Drillon Shoots Leafs Into Stanley Cup Finals With Brilliant Overtime Goal

(By JACK CALDER Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, April 2—(CP)—No longer can Gordon Drillon, hockey's young payoff man from Moncton, N. B., be called a scoring opportunist. If ever a player made his own opportunity it was Drillon Saturday night, when he raced the length of the ice at Maple Leaf Gardens to bring Toronto a 5-4 overtime victory over Detroit Red Wings, shooting the Maple Leafs into the Stanley Cup finals. The 23-year-old right winger, in his third season as a National Leaguer, broke a bitter deadlock after five minutes and 42 seconds of extra play while a crowd of 13,783 paying customers went wild.

The brilliant drive put the Leafs into a best-of-seven games round for professional hockey's world championship. It meant thousands of dollars in the bank for the team and for Maple Leaf Gardens, the club and rink, put the immediate reaction of both into a few words: "We can just thank Providence when these things happen to us."
