"I'm Alone" Case Cropping Up Again

SHREVEPORT, La., Dec. 12.-Echoes of the I'm Alone rum ship sinking by coast guardsmen which led Canada and the United States into arbitration in 1929 may be heard January 3, when a series at Opelousas, La., on tariff and dry law charges. Philip H. Mecom, United States attorney, announced here yesterday that the long pending trial of Dan Hogan and others implicated in the I'm Alone case would be called just after the first of the year. Hogan now serving a term in the Atlanta federal prison, was convicted along with several others on similar charges at Lake Charles.

The I'm Alone was sunk March 22, 1929, by U. S. coast guardsmen and owners of the vessel said it was of Canadian registry. The sinking involved Canada and the United States in an arbitration. "Big Jim" Clark, one of the defendants in the I'm Alone case, was killed in New Orleans some months ago and officials said it was rumored some alleged confederates shot him.
