WORKHOUSES IN GREAT BRITAIN

An Army of Paupers in England and Wales—
Figures from a Blue Book—English Election Humors in Prose and Rhyme—Great Library's Jubilee.

From a Blue-book dealing with old folks in receipt of parish relief in England and Wales in September, 1903, it appears that the number of paupers over 60 years of age was 338,634, and of these 48,064 were in London. The number over 16 years of age was 490,313, including 71,056 in London. The ratio per cent. of paupers over 60 to the total number of paupers over 16 was 69.0 (67.6 in London and 69.3 in England and Wales). Of the 338,634 paupers (123,675 men and 214,959 women) over 60 years of age, 95,684 (56,471 men and 39,213 women) were in the workhouses and 242,950 (67,204 men and 175,746 women) were receiving outdoor relief.

The total number of indoor paupers over 60 years of age who, in the opinion of the medical officers of the institutions in which the paupers were maintained, could not satisfactorily take care of themselves owing to mental or physical infirmity is set down at 57,942 (30,769 men and 27,173 women); and the number of other paupers over 60 who were not described as being in this condition is given at 37,742 (25,702 men and 12,040 women). The indoor paupers who were described as being unable to satisfactorily take care of themselves by reason of mental or physical infirmity formed 60.6 per cent. of the total number of indoor paupers over 60, and 17.1 per cent. of

the total number of both indoor and outdoor paupers over that age. It will be observed that the proportion in this condition in the case of women was much larger than in the case of men.

Returns relating to old-age pauperism were presented to Parliament in August, 1890, in January, 1892, in July 1899, and January, 1900. The figures are tabulated and compared with those of the present return. It appears that the paupers of 65 years of age and upwards on Aug. 1, 1890, numbered 245,687. On Jan. 1, 1892, the number was 268,397; on July 1, 1899, the number was 278,718; and on Jan. 1, 1900, the number was 286,929; while the present return gives the total of 284,265. In comparing these figures allowance must be made for the fact that the number of paupers is always higher in January than in July, August, or September, and also for the fact that the returns for Aug. 1, 1890, and Sept. 1, 1903, excluded, whereas the returns relating to the other dates did not exclude, persons who were only in receipt of relief constructively by reason of relief being given to wives or children. After making such allowance, it appears that the proportion of paupers over 65 years of age in the total number of adult paupers has not varied much, though it has risen since Jan. 1, 1892, and that the proportion of paupers over 65 years of age to the estimated number of persons in England and Wales over that age on the respective dates has remained almost the same.
