## Annual Meeting S'ide Sub Division C. W. L.

Mrs. Joseph Callaghan Gives Comprehensive Review Of Work Of The Division. Mrs. W.J. Sullivan New President.

The annual meeting of the Summerside Sub-division of the Catholic Women's League was held on Wednesday evening in the Knights of Columbus Home, the President, Mrs. Joseph Callaghan presiding. There was a very large attendance. Rev. Dr. MacLellan was present and congratulated the Division on the splendid work they had accomplished during the past year. The work had been outstanding, especially in the child welfare and social service departments. He hoped they would continue in well doing. Mrs. Callaghan, in her annual report, gave a comprehensive review of the activities of the Division.

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Rev. Chaplain, Officers and Members of The Catholic Women's League.— Another year has come to a close, marking the third in the history of the Summerside Sub-division of the Catholic Women's League, and it is my duty and privilege to present a report outlining the activities of the year, which, I think, you will agree has been the banner year of our organization.

During the year, eleven regular, ten Executive, and two Special meetings were held; this does not include the innumerable Committee Meetings held during September. At the closing of the schools, prizes were donated by the League to pupils of the Convent and High School.

The Diocesan Convention held here in September—11th, 12th, and 13th, was the major event of our activities for the year 1934. On that occasion we had the honor of having with us our National President, Mrs. J. Coffey, of Montreal, whose charm and wealth of information proved a source of inspiration to all. Mrs. Coffey, in an eloquent address, told of the aims and objects of the League, and specially stressed the need of co-operation of all members.

We were privileged indeed to have with us our beloved Bishop. His Most Reverend Excellency J. A. O'Sullivan, who addressed us twice during the Convention, and whose valuable advice we have endeavored to follow. To his effort is attributed the growth of the League throughout the Province, as many new subdivisions have been organized.

Rev. Dr. McMahon, Chancellor of the Diocese, was also present, and addressed us in a most eloquent manner.

A very cordial welcome was extended to the visitors by His Worship, Mayor Lidstone.

To all who assisted in any way to make our Convention the success it was, we extend our sincere thanks.

To the Press, who reported our Convention, in such a capable manner, and for their generous gift of space, we are indeed grateful.

Two very successful Parties were held during the year, one at the Olympia, and one at the C. Y. M. L. Hall; both proved a financial success, which aided us greatly in carrying on our good work.

In the month of November, a Committee from this sub-division undertook, at the request of our Chaplain, to obtain signatures of our Catholic people on a petition known as "The Legion of Decency." This movement originated in the United States and was organized by Catholic Bishops, and was strongly supported by leaders of other faiths.

The purpose of the movement was to combat the evils of immoral and indecent pictures, and not to combat or injure the Motion Picture industry, but rather to induce the producers to provide good, clean, and wholesome entertainment.

At Christmas, the usual activities were carried on. A number of boxes were sent to the Orphanage by members of the League, and also others outside the League contributed to this most worthy cause.

A great many boxes were sent to those in need in our own Church, and we deeply appreciated all those who so generously contributed, thus helping us to send to all those that were in need, and make Christmas a happy one.

The Study Club was resumed last month under the direction of our Chaplain, Dr. MacLellan. More individual interest is shown this year, and, as time goes on, I am sure our members will realize the necessity of adult education, which is the main purpose or objective of all Study Clubs.

While it is not my intention to give a detailed account of the work covered in the reports of the various conveners, I cannot refrain from a reference to our Social Service and "Social Service" work. The term, "Social Service" and "Child Welfare" is a comprehensive one, which practically covers all the activities of the League. However, its specific scope is to deal with assistance to mothers, to children, to school age, and to help the poor and needy. The Social Service Convener will give you a detailed account of the number of articles bought and sent out of the Sewing Room. Over

\$400.00 was expended on Social Service during the year. Every Wednesday afternoon some of the members of the League meet at the C. of C. Home and make over old clothing as well as new; we are grateful indeed to all those who sent donations of clothing to the Sewing Room.

To the ladies of the Sewing Circle who have been so faithful during my term of office, I cannot express in words my appreciation and gratitude to them. Never once have they failed to do their part, and I only hope that more of the members will endeavor to find time to devote to this wonderful work, as it is hard to realize just how much good is being done in this department.

Children were dressed for First Communion and Confirmation as well as for school.

Cocoa has been supplied to the convent for the past four months; the results have been very gratifying, which compensates for any little trouble we have to finance this work.

To the kind Sisters of the Convent we extend our grateful appreciation for their co-operation with us in this work. They very unselfishly gave their time in the morning to make the Cocoa and give it to the children, thus enabling us to carry out this wonderful work. In order to augment our funds for this cause, a Milk Fund was started. The response was generous, and to all those who contributed so generously to the Fund we extend our heartfelt thanks.

Funds to carry on our work were raised from Membership Fees, Family Sales, a Bazaar Sale, Envelope Collection, and Lotteries. Two beautiful mats were hooked by the ladies of the Sewing Circle; the sum of \$28.80; the other is now being marketed, and promises to be very successful.

Masses were said for the Souls in Purgatory, deceased Soldiers, one for one of our members who died during the year, letters of sympathy were sent to those in grief, and at Easter we sent a Lily for the Altar, and on Armistice Day we placed a wreath at the Soldiers' Monument.

All our Diocesan and National obligations have been fulfilled, all our bills paid, and the Treasury shows a good amount to start this year with.

We thank the Knights of Columbus for their great generosity in giving us the use of their rooms for our many activities, especially during the Convention. It would be practically impossible to conduct so many lines of work without their co-operation.

We have representation on the Children's Aid as well as the Public Library Committee.

Before closing, I wish to extend to our beloved Chaplain, Rev. Dr. MacLellan, our heartfelt gratitude and appreciation for the interest he has taken in our League, and the many words of advice and encouragement he has given us, and under whose direction our work has been carried on.

It has indeed been a great pleasure and an honor to serve as your President, and I wish, personally, to thank the Officers, Convener, and members for their loyalty and co-operation. Never once have you failed to do your part; your splendid co-operation in every undertaking has reaped reward, and you can look back on a year of labor and of sacrifice, yes, but also of splendid achievements.

Much as we have accomplished we are still not satisfied, for we see so much that should be attended to if more of our ladies would interest themselves in this work.

You belong to a National Organization; cultivate, therefore, a National outlook, and direct your efforts for the good and welfare of all humanity.
