MONTREAL, Sept. 7.—(CP)—Buyers displayed a fancy for a few favorites in trading on the stock exchange on Saturday and promoted them to higher ground.

Utilities appearing were firmer, both Montreal Power and Brazilian edging up fractions. Brazilians were steady.

Howard Smith Corporation preferred lost an early gain. Hudson Bay Mining was in arrears in mines.

Canadian Pacific Railway advanced the minimum fraction in rails. In miscellaneous, National Breweries extended its gains of Thursday and Friday and Wabasso Cotton picked up a point.

Both hung up new highs. Industrials were almost uniformly better on the curb market. Issues to secure gains were British American Oil, Commercial Alcohol, Eastern Dairies, Fleet Aircraft backtracked.

In papers, Abitibi common was improved and Consolidated Paper down a fraction.

Mines were traded in fairly large volume for a Saturday. Malartic Gold Fields showed an advance to 1.69. Other grades posting moderate gains included Lamaque, MacLeod-Cockshutt, Mining Corporation Moneta, Powell Rouyn, and Teck Hughes. Minor losses were noted by Francoeur, Kerr-Adison, Perron, Pickle Crow, Premier, Preston, Siscoe, Sullivan and Wright-Hargreaves.

The base metal shares moved in light volume and Nickel, Steel Erect and Falconbridge were narrowly higher against small losses for Smelter, Noranda and Waite-Amulet.

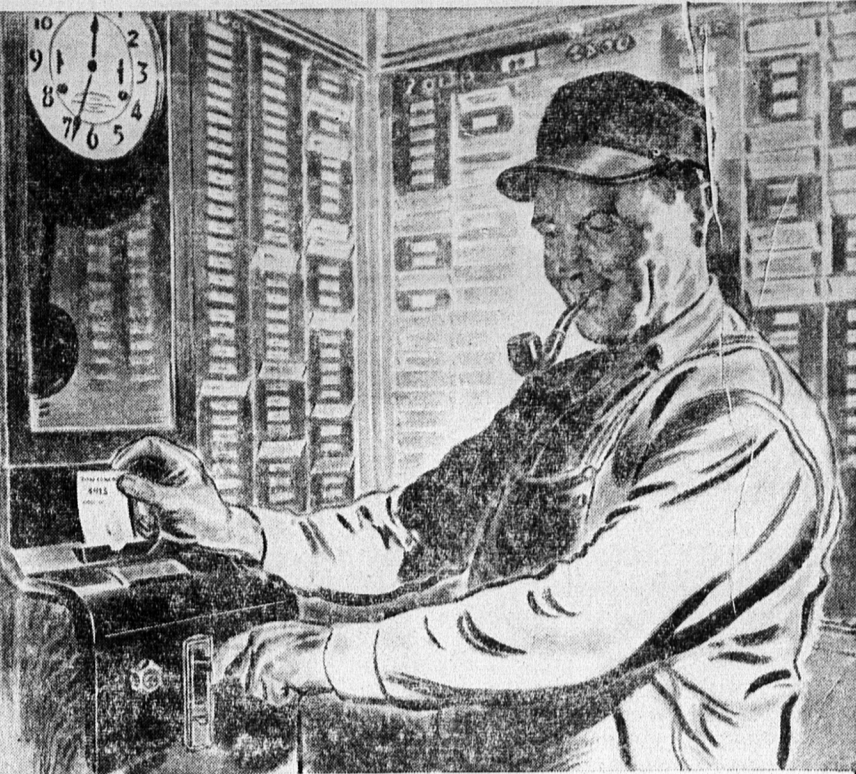
