SIDE BOARD OF TRADE

A discussion took place on the proposed siting of the Commission to inquire into the feasibility of constructing a canal connecting the Bay of Fundy with Northumberland Strait, which will be held in Charlottetown on November 4th.

The reports of the different committees were received and satisfactory progress noted.

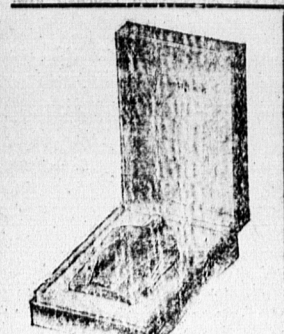

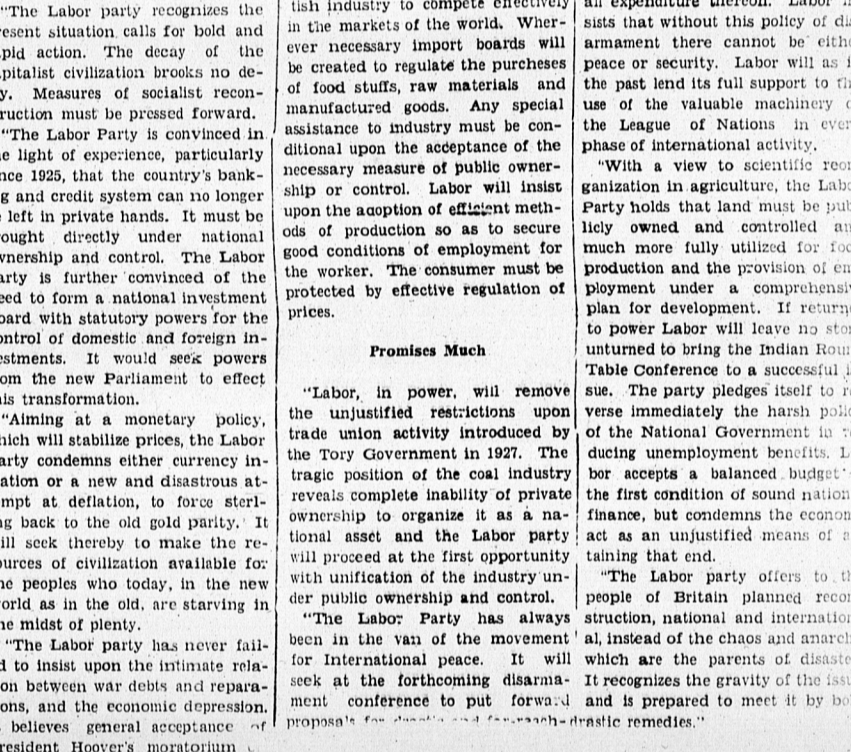
