Native of this City passes at Cambridge, Mass. Friends throughout the Maritimes learned with regret of the death yesterday morning in Cambridge, Mass., of Ernest Hunter-Duvar. He was born in Charlottetown in September 1860 but had lived a great deal at Hernewood near Alberton.
