SCHOOL OF SCIENCE

The Trip From Summer- side to Bear River

PREPARING FOR WORK

Meeting Which Was Held In The Baptist Church Thurs- day evening

Leaving Charlottetown on the morning of July 24th armed with sundry introductions to different parties, we started a company of three in high spirits, and full of anticipation for an enjoyable time at Bear River, N. S. for the next two weeks, attending the Summer School of Science.

The trip to Summerside was passed in pleasant and profitable conversation with G. F. Beer, Esq. who gave considerable information respecting British Columbia, its resources, present state of development and future possibilities. Mr. Beer in common with many of the most progressive men of the Dominion holds very strong opinions as to the necessity of the educational systems of the Country being made more practical in the direction of giving the pupils a better knowledge of the resources and possibilities of the Dominion as a whole, also to teach them to observe what is round and about them.

The trip across in the Northumberland was a thoroughly enjoyable one, the day being delightfully fine, water smooth, and everything combined to make the voyage a delight. Several former acquaintances were unexpectedly met with on the steamer, and all too soon we reached Point du Chene, and without delay started for St. John.

On the train some were met with the same destination as we had in view, namely the Summer School. Old acquaintanceship was renewed and pleasant converse had with them.

To a P. E. Islander the country between Point du Chene and St. John does not appear to be one well adapted to agriculture. The patch work cultivation of the field appears odd, one small field having in all the varieties of grains and roots found in an ordinary farm.

Before reaching St. John we were made aware of our near approach by the presence of the fog which, while sombre in hue, was delightfully cool after the heat experienced on the way from Moncton.

On Wednesday we crossed the Bay of Fundy in a dense fog. We reached

DEWITT OFFERED

To Surrender, But Not Unconditionally.

AN IMPERIAL DECREE

Says Foreign Ministers in Pekin are Safe—Britain's Coal Supply.

DEWITT OFFERED TO SURRENDER.
LONDON, July 28.—(Special).—General Dewitt offered to surrender on condition that his followers be permitted to return to their homes unmolested. Lord Roberts refused anything but unconditional surrender.

THE COAL SUPPLY.
The Government is considering the appointment of a Royal Commission on the question of naval coal supply, owing to the increasing cheapness of American coal and the diminishing supply of Welsh steam coal.

REPORT THE AMBASSADORS SAFE.
PARIS, July 28.—(Special).—The Chinese Minister has an Imperial decree declaring the Foreign Ministers were safe and sound July 24th and were being supplied with provisions by the Government, but all other reports confirm the impression that the Ambassadors have been murdered.

The same message has been sent other powers. There is no other Chinese news to-day.

MINISTER WU SAYS THEY ARE SAFE.
WASHINGTON, July 28.—(Special).—Minister Wu declares the Ambassadors are alive. As the latest news is not from any minor official, but an Imperial edict issued on authority of the Chinese Government it is therefore said to be thoroughly reliable.
