COST OF GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC.

Mr. Borden, the Opposition leader, has been figuring on the cost to Canada of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. It will be remembered that this great road is divided into three sections, (1) the road from Moncton to Winnipeg, to be built and owned by the Government, but leased to the company; (2) the prairie section from Winnipeg to the mountains, to be built and owned by the Company, and (3) the mountain section, on to the Pacific coast to be built and owned by the Company. But the Government is to guarantee the bonds of the Company for 75 per cent of the mountain section and for \$13,000 per mile of the prairie section.

Mr. Borden has taken the Government's revised estimates of the cost of the three sections as the basis of his calculation, together with the stipulated interest charges which the Government must pay during construction and until the company begins to be liable for rental. He adds the probable cost of the Quebec bridge, which is part of the system and on which \$5,430,000 has been already paid, and which he estimates it will take nine millions more to complete. And to this he adds \$5,470,000 for cost of terminals and shops at Moncton, Quebec and Winnipeg.

The cost of the eastern division, Moncton to Winnipeg, is estimated by the Government at \$111,393,765. To this Mr. Borden adds interest during construction, \$10,000,434, also interest for seven years after completion, during which term the company is to pay no rental, \$26,124,676, and also interest at three per cent for three years more, during which period the Company will pay no rental unless the earnings are sufficient. This would make \$11,196,290 more and would bring the cost of the eastern division up to \$131,616,423, including the Quebec bridge, terminals and shops.

To these he adds the Government's guarantee of 75 per cent of the cost of the mountain section, or \$46,140,000, and makes the total cash expenditure \$191,305,823. And to this he adds the Government guarantee of the bond issue for the prairie and mountain sections amounting to \$58,048,000. The grand total of cash expenditure and liability incurred is thus run up to \$249,353,823.

It may fairly be assumed that the Company has a good enough bargain to enable it to take care of the bonds. And this big interest bill of thirty-seven odd millions will be at the worst spread over some fifteen years, and will not have to be paid all at once. For instance, Canada is already paying some six millions a year in interest on the cost of the Government railways and canals. If this interest bill for fifteen years were brought into one lump sum it would make a total of ninety millions.

Still after making all allowance for excess in Mr. Borden's calculation, it will be apparent that the Grand Trunk Pacific will be a very costly business and much more costly than was at first set forth. Canada could still build it and carry the burden, even if it should cost the \$250,000,000 which Mr. Borden has figured out, and should run the net debt of the country up to four hundred millions, as he says it will. We do not think it will turn out so serious as that, but at the best Canada will have to borrow a great deal of money in the next ten years, and is already paying for new loans much higher rates than she paid a few years ago.

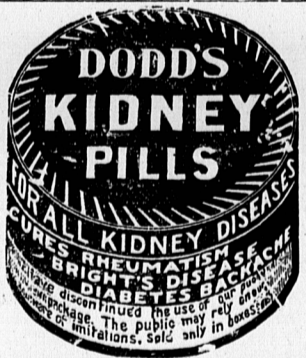
