

**Suicide Of Noted Engineer**

WELLESLEY, Mass., March 28—A policeman forced his way into the home of Bernard A. Behrend, 56, internationally known authority on electricity and engineer, today and found Behrend dead on the floor. A pistol lay beside the body and police told Mrs. Behrend when she reached the house later her husband apparently had shot himself.

The policeman was called by Charles McGillis of Waltham, who had driven Behrend to his home from Cambridge. He said he was instructed to wait outside but when Behrend failed to return McGillis tried to get into the house and found it locked. He became suspicious and called a policeman. Dr. Frederic A. Stanwood, assistant Medical examiner, said Behrend had been shot through the heart but declined any further statement.

Behrend had been in ill health recently and had been a patient at the Cambridge Hospital.

He was born in Villeneuve, Switzerland, and was educated in England and Germany. He had served as non-resident lecturer at McGill University in Montreal and at the University of Wisconsin and Sanford University. In 1904 he was awarded the gold medal of the Franklin Institute in 1912. He had served as a member of the committee organization of the International Electrical Congress in St. Louis in 1904.

Behrend had served as chief electrical engineer and consulting engineer of the Allis-Chalmers Company and Allis-Chalmers-Bullock, Ltd., Montreal.

**Ball Meeting**
