B., where his parents now reside. It appears that he and several other boys of about his own age, were playing on the public wharf, when in some unaccountable way, the child fell into the water, where there is a strong current, and the body was not recovered until late in the evening. The wharf is just back of his home and is quite near the Buctouche bridge. Besides the parents, seven brothers and sisters survive.

NEW INDUSTRY FOR SUMMERSIDE.—It has been the privilege of hustling Summerside to add the newest addition to the growing list of new Island industries, and rightly enough the newcomer is closely allied to the fox industry, which originated in the western part of the province. It has long been desired to have some kind of ranch enclosure, that would eliminate the unsanitary and unhygienic conditions that so often prevail, caused by the permanent nature of the old stile ranches. We understand the association has made an offer to rent the grounds to the department of agriculture if the latter will take full charge of the exhibition, but nothing has yet been done. It is quite possible, however, whether an exhibition is held or not, that there will be horse races held in Summerside in October. Some prominent horsemen are asking for a two days' meet immediately following the Charlottetown St. Raphael, the guests of Mr. Exhibition, and no doubt this will be the plan adopted. We are inclined to think, however, that every effort should be made to hold an agricultural exhibition. Summerside Exchange.
