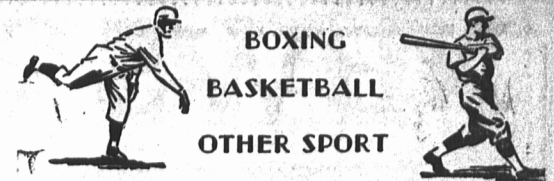

ARCHWORTH CAPTURES RUNNING OF KING'S PLATE BY TEN LENGTHS AS THEIR MAJESTIES LOOK ON

Warrington In Fine Shape For Defence Of Title

NEW YORK, May 22—(CP)—Terry (The Tiger) Warrington, Nova Scotia claimant of the Canadian Heavy and Light-heavyweight Boxing Championships, wound up New York training today for his June 1 title-defense against Eddie New York in Edmonton and prepared to leave for Alberta tomorrow.

The tan thumper from Liverpool, N. S., went through three rounds of sparring with Boston French Canadian s.s. then defeated his defence for two rounds against the boys' shots of Abe Feldman, New York, who recently was knocked out by Tony Galento. After the stiff session Terry scaled 176, a pound more than he expects to take in the ring against the Edmonton challenger.

"Warrington is in the best shape of his career," Bobby North, his manager, said as he unwound the tape from the negro's hands. "We both feel Wensob won't be able to get the full route of 15 rounds."

Archworth Admired By His Majesty

WOODBINE TRACK, Toronto, May 22—The King knows a good one on the track when he sees him.

"What horse is that?" he asked today as Archworth flashed past the royal box at the start of the mile and a furlong King's Plate. Premier Mitchell Hepburn told him.

The King glued his field-glasses on Archworth for the rest of the race, watching the C. George McCullagh-owned favorite come down 10 lengths in the lead. Both the King and Queen stood throughout the race.

There was no doubt about His Majesty's admiration for Archworth as the handsome three-year-old paraded back to the enclosure. When the King went to the infield to present the plate and 50 guineas, he questioned Mr. McCullagh closely on the horse's history.

"And how did you come to own him?" the King asked.

Mr. McCullagh told of buying Archworth at public sale two years ago from W. H. Wright who bred the speedster at his Barrie, Ont., farm.

The King congratulated him upon the showing of the horse and the work of trainer Mark Cowell and jockey Dinney Blakey.

Most owners who had horses in the Plate admitted the race in formal morning clothes—just in case they might be presented to His Majesty.

Mr. McCullagh wore a grey-blue business suit, a blue shirt, white collar and was hatless.

The 50 guineas he received were a purple-and-gold velvet bag.

Blue Peter Favored For Epsom Derby

LONDON, May 22—(CP Cable)—The Earl of Rosebery's Blue Peter continued to rule 75 to 23 favorite for the derby at Epsom Wednesday in tonight's callover of odds at the race.

Feature of the betting was the sudden shortening of Fox Cub's odds to 21 to 2 which made him the second favorite and which was attributed by many to the magic name of his jockey, Gordon Richards, the perennial wizard of the English turf. Fox Cub was only fancied at 100 to 7 in the last callover.

Second favorite for the classic is Hypnotist, owned by William Woodward of New York and quoted at 17 to 2.

NEW YORK, May 22—(AP)—The Athletics' four-game American League baseball winning streak was cracked today by the home-run bats of Mel Mazera and Harland Clift which gave St. Louis Browns a 6-3 victory at Philadelphia.

Mazera's circuit clout in the fourth inning shattered a 2-3 tie. With two down in the fifth and one on, Clift blasted a home-tripper to score the winning runs. Upset Marks Opening Of Golf Tourney

HOYLAKE, England, May 22—One upset—the defeat of Hon. Michael Scott who won the title here in 1933—marked opening play as the first round of the 1939 British amateur golf championship was contested today over the exceptionally long royal Liverpool course.

While Scott was finding his 61 years a bit of a burden to carry over Hoylake's vast distances, bowing to Tom Edwards of Wales 2 to 1, the defending titleholder, Charlie Yates of Atlanta, Ga., discovered the combination he needed in a spot of sunlight and a \$1 putter to overcome his practice slump and defeat Bruce Thompson, local bond salesman, 5 and 4.

CINCINNATI REDS CHALK UP SEVENTH STRAIGHT VICTORY AT EXPENSE OF THE DODGERS

NEW YORK, May 22—(AP)—Cincinnati Reds hit "in the clutch" today and won their seventh straight National baseball game 6-3 over Brooklyn Dodgers.

Lefty Lee Grissom blanked the Brooklyn for six innings, but weakened in the ninth and Gene Thompson finished up after the Dodgers scored two runs in the closing frame.

Luke Hamlin, who started for the Dodgers, suffered his third straight setback before he gave way to Russ Evans in the eighth. Neither Lou Fette nor Bill Lee, the starting pitchers, finished the game as Boston Bees, winning 5-3, managed to even their series with Chicago Cubs at one apiece.

Fette was taken out after allowing six hits in five innings and Left Erickson finished the game, allowing only three more Cub hits. Lee was taken out for a pinch hitter in the eighth after he had given up nine hits.

New York Giants rallied behind Hal Schumacher's best pitching of the year to tremble the Pirates 9-2 and end their two-game losing run.

Disappointed at the Giants' recent record of winning only four games in 12 starts before today, Bill Terry benched catcher Harry Danning, in favor of Ken O'Lea, and put Johnny McCarthy on first base in place of Zeke Bonura.

Schumacher went the route for the first time in six starts, allowing only six hits, four of them by "Jeep" Handley. The Giants belted three hurriers for 12 hits.

Morton Cooper, young St. Louis Cardinal right hander, held Philadelphia Phillies to four hits, three of them doubles by Harshel Martin, to turn in a 2-1 victory and maintain the Redbirds' slim lead over Cincinnati.

Except for the Philadelphia centre fielder's extra-base blows, only Al Hollingsworth, Dog Prothro's hurrier, was able to hit Cooper.
