### FUNERAL SATURDAY.—The funeral of Q. M. S. Ernest Carr was held Saturday at 2.30 p. m. from the residence of his mother, Mrs. George Carr, Grafton street, and was largely attended by private citizens, the soldiers of the overcoats drafts under Lt. McGuigan and a number of returned veterans including Major Stanley, Lt. White, Gunner Strain, Pte. Stewart, Pte. Hokinson and others. Majors Leigh and Rev. Dr. Fullerton were also present. The services at the house and grave were held by Rev. P. H. Littlejohns and were under military auspices. Quarter Master Sergeant Carr was attached to Pier No. 2 Hospital staff and was on duty when the great disaster occurred and bravely stuck to his post until killed. A particularly sad feature of this case was that he is the son of a wife, a bride of but nine months was severely injured in their home in another part of the stricken city. She is now in hospital and does not yet know that her husband is dead. To the sorrowing parents and relatives the sympathy of the entire city goes forth, in which The Guardian joins. Sergeant Carr was a former employee

of the Guardian and was an excellent workman and faithful friend in every way.
