Messrs Harry and Leonard McKenzie returned to their homes in Bay Fortune from Nova Scotia, where they were working in the lumber woods.

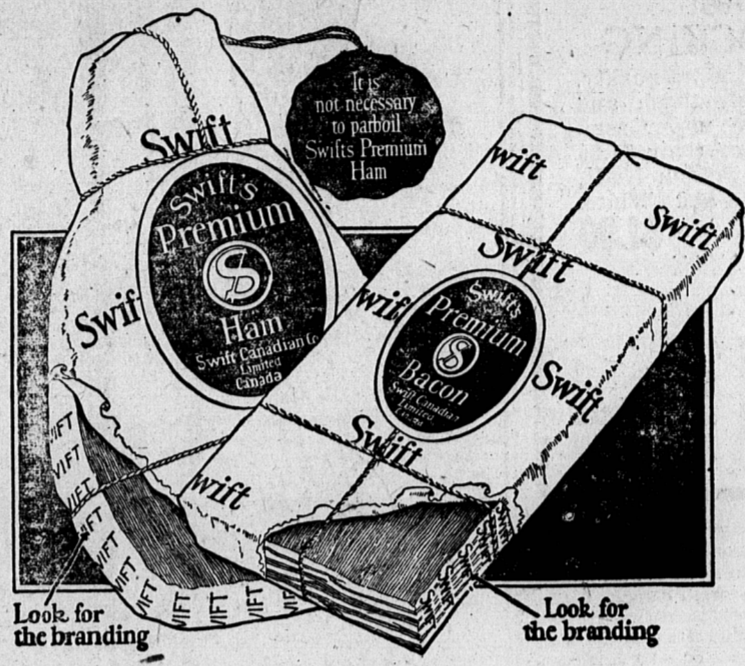
