(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, March 25.—Strong northerly winds, unsettled and cold with occasional falls of rain or sleet.

The temperature at three o'clock this morning by the Rexall Store Tested Thermometer with a northern exposure was twenty-eight degrees above and with a southern exposure was thirty above.

WEATHER.—Yesterday after an hour of early sunshine, rain began to fall turning to hail in afternoon and snow in the evening, continuing all night. About 4 inches fell.

The lowest temperature recorded yesterday was twenty-seven degrees above zero and the highest was forty-eight above.

MOST APPALLING DISASTER IN HISTORY OF U. S.

(Continued from page one) Dayton. (Canadian Press) LAFAYETTE, Ind., March 25.—At 3.15 p. m. West Lafayette where the Purdue University is located was cut off from this side by the breaking of one of the levees and the submerging of another levee which is expected to break at any moment.

The river is two miles wide at this point. Business houses are preparing to move anticipating a rise during the night. No inter-urban lines are being operated and the steam lines are making little effort to maintain traffic.

(Canadian Press) CINCINNATI, March 25.—Sixty are dead and probably more in Dayton, according to Frank Brandon, vice-president of the Dayton, Lebanon and Cincinnati Railway.

Mr. Brandon says the situation is appalling and beyond all control. "According to my advice," he says "the situation beggars description."

(Canadian Press) TERRE HAUTE, March 25.—Further search among the ruins left in the path of Sunday night's tornado failed to reveal any more bodies.

The total deaths to-day remained at 20 but some of the injured now in the hospitals will probably die. Search continues for persons still missing.

The list of injured reaches nearly 250. The militia is on duty to prevent looting of which, so far, very little is reported.

(Canadian Press) CINCINNATI, Mar. 25.—A message from Cincinnati says it is reported there that a reservoir at Hamilton, Ohio, broke tonight and ten are reported dead.

(Canadian Press) TOUHAUTE, Mar. 25.—Probably ten thousand are dead and twenty-five thousand homeless. The hydrant of the dam at Pique, Ohio, has gone out. An unconfirmed report says 510 lives are lost.

(Canadian Press) SPRINGFIELD, Ohio, Mar. 25.—The Mayor of Dayton says, reports unconfirmed, say that 5000 are dead and 30,000 homeless. In Springfield there is no loss of life but 1,500 are homeless.

(Canadian Press) INDIANAPOLIS, Mar. 25.—Hundreds at Fern, survivors of the flood are grouped on the hills waiting for daylight.

(Continued from page one) etraghed his apologies to the Premier.

The SPEAKER referring to the discussion on Thursday, said that in looking into the rules he found that irregularity in attendance was not so trifling a matter as one might think. Rule 25 provided that members not in attendance when called shall be taken into custody. (Laughter.) MR. RICHARDS: It would be well to enforce that rule.

PRESENTING ADDRESS

HON. MR. MATHIESON, Premier, intimated that His Honor the Governor would be prepared to receive the reply to the address at a quarter to four, and at that hour the Speaker accompanied by most of the members proceeded to the Council Chamber where the reply was formally presented by Mr. John Kennedy, Chairman of the Committee. On returning the Speaker read His Honor's acknowledgment, and thereafter the ordinary business was resumed.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS

THE PREMIER laid over the report of the Provincial Auditor on the public accounts of the Province for the fiscal period extending from 30th September, 1911 to 31st December, 1912. The report was referred to the committee on public accounts. THE PREMIER laid over the report of Mr. Rossborough, the special auditor, and moved that the report be printed with the journals of the House. Mr. Rossborough made an independent audit not only for the purpose of verifying the accounts but for ascertaining the exact amount of the liabilities of the province.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS REPORT

THE PREMIER moved that the annual report of the Public Schools from Oct. 1, 1911 to December 31, 1912 be laid on the table and also that on the

should be read, which was done by the clerk.

INCORPORATION OF ALBERTON

On the motion of Hon. Chas. Dalton the second reading of the bill for the incorporation of Alberton was taken.

NEW BILLS

THE PREMIER introduced a bill respecting the Legislative Assembly which was read a first time. A bill was introduced to amend the act to incorporate The Island Guardian Pub. Co. The bill to incorporate The Island Fox Co. Ltd. was read a second time, and taken in committee. Mr. L. L. Jenkins in the chair. THE PREMIER suggested a change in the title and this was concurred in by several other members; and finally the clause was allowed to stand over. The SPEAKER took the chair and the Chairman of the Committee reported progress and asked leave to sit again. The House adjourned until 3 o'clock this afternoon.

THE WAR.

LONDON, March 23.—The new crisis in the Balkans has led to the instant recall from their Easter vacations, ambassadors in London, of the European powers.

They met in conference today to discuss the situation. The interesting dispatch from the beleaguered fortress of Adrianople received this morning shows that the garrison under Shukri Pasha has no intention of capitulating. The message was sent by wireless telegraph to Constantinople and thence cabled abroad.

In the north Austria reiterated even more sharply than before the demands made by the Austrian minister at Cetinje on March 20th, which were as follows:—

First—The free exit from the fortress of Scutari of all non-combatants.

Second—Explanations of the death of a Catholic priest named Palle, who is said to have been slaughtered because he opposed the violent conversions of prisoners.

Third—Violent conversions to cease instantly.

Fourth—Full satisfaction to be given for the violence of the Montenegrins and Servians at San Giovanni Di Media on the Adriatic coast against the crew of the Austrian merchant vessel Skodra.

With the view of hastening the solution of the question of Albania the Austro-Hungarian government has agreed that the town of Jakova shall be ceded to Servia on condition that the northern frontier of Albania be delimited in conformity with Austria's wishes.

DR. ROSS GIVES ADDRESS

Dr. Alexander Ross, Charlottetown, who had been asked to give an address at this meeting was next called upon. The doctor gave as his subject "the change that has taken place during the past twenty-five years with reference to the use of alcohol as a medicine". A great change, he said, had taken place, due to increasing knowledge of the effect of drugs as a result of more thorough and more accurate research. No other subject in recent years had engaged the attention of the medical world as had that of the effect of alcohol upon the human system. Formerly it was largely used as a medicine, generally with little good effect and very often with positive injury. Steadily on account of advancing knowledge, its use is being discontinued and here it is being discontinued, describing minutely and interestingly its effect upon the various bodily functions and leading to the conclusion that it was better for the world if all its alcoholic drinks were thrown into the sea. His address was listened to with keen attention and generously applauded.

The President, on behalf of the Alliance thanked Dr. Ross for his very instructive address.

A PLEASING SOLO

At this stage, Miss Ross, daughter of Mr. Murdoch Ross, sang most pleasingly a solo, Spring is Coming. Professor McIntyre playing the accompaniment. AN INSPIRING ADDRESS

ion and which had caused the province to be better advertised than any other part of the continent. The liquor business had been found to be a bad business. The poor and the criminal must be cared for at the expense of the country and the business that produces these is an unprofitable one. No boy ever became rich by drinking whiskey; no city and no country ever thrived on account of the liquor business.

Some people say there is more whiskey drunk in prohibition countries than where it is openly sold. He had examined the statistics of certain states with respect to the consumption of liquors. In prohibition communities the consumption was 1.5 gallons per head; in local option communities it was 4 gallons per head and in license communities 25 gallons per head. It is only the liquor drinkers and the liquor sellers who claim that prohibition does not prohibit.

A FOOLISH THING

It is a foolish thing for a boy or a man to begin drinking liquor. Here he instanced a number of cases which came under his own personal observation. Men whom he knew twenty years ago are showing to-day the foolishness or the wisdom of the course they adopted then with reference to drink. Drink has led to poverty and dependence; total abstinence to prosperity and independence. It has been said that the liquor business helps the business of the town or city and that the country trade goes to the towns in which liquor is sold. This is not so. A commercial traveller recently told him that of his 300 customers quite a number, some years ago, gave him better business if inspired by a "nip" from a bottle which he then always carried. To-day he would not dare attempt such a thing. Of his 300 customers to-day not one would be influenced by a drink and most of them would resent the offer of a drink.

The bar-room is a school for tipplers and is a bad business institution and an immoral institution, and anything that is had for business and for morals should find no place in a community.

A POLITICAL QUESTION

The liquor question is a political one. If the friends of temperance do not make it political its enemies will. The liquor interests will fight for their brewers and distillers and bar-rooms. He was glad the Alliance was going to distribute temperance literature; the liquor interests would do this also and the friends of temperance would need to be on the alert.

He advised, courage, consistency, persistency, a campaign of education to instill into the young a sense of the evils resulting from the traffic.

BOY COMMISSION

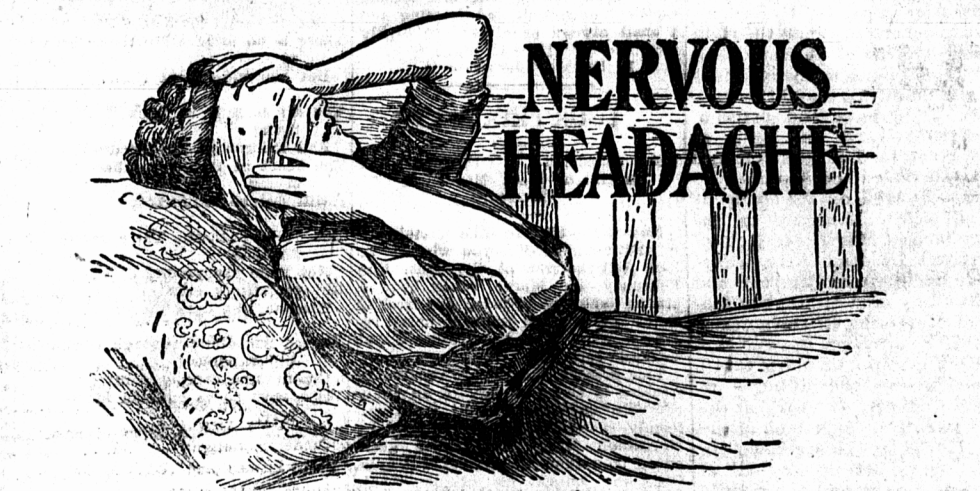
He had seen in some of the P. E. Island Railway stations a placard warning farmers against potato canker and warning them that concealment of the disease was punishable. A commission had been sent all over the country by the dominion government to warn people against the danger of concealment. He hoped to see, ere long, a Boy Commission set up by the same government to warn parents against the dangers to which their boys are subjected through the liquor traffic and to warn them against the danger that lurks in the concealed bar-room.

People say the traffic cannot be stopped. The tipplers and the rum-sellers say it. No one who has faith in Almighty God will say it cannot be stopped.

In a splendid oration he wound up one of the best temperance addresses ever heard in Charlottetown with the statement that he did not care how big the liquor business is the Church of the living God, if true to itself, can crush it.

Prolonged applause followed after which the thanks of the Alliance was tendered the reverend speaker. Mr. F. H. Campbell, Superintendent of Education was called upon but on account of the late hour he confined his remarks to a brief commendation of the suggestion made by Mr. Grant with reference to providing temperance literature for the schools. He also stated that no change had been made in the course of study with reference to the teaching of scientific temperance. The text-book now in use is being allowed to go out of print but its place will be taken by a better book.

The meeting closed with the Doxology. The Alliance meets again this morning at 9 o'clock.
