

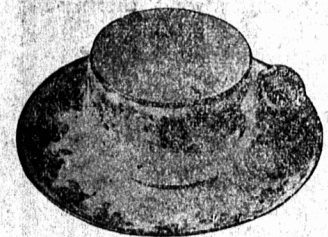

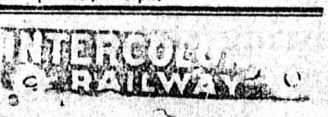

KAISER AND SON HAVE BURIED THE HATCHET

BERLIN, Jan. 28.—The most im-
 portant feature of the Kaiser's birth-
 day celebration yesterday was the re-
 port that the Emperor and the
 Crown Prince are at last reconciled,
 after their many differences which re-
 sulted in the Crown Prince being
 practically exiled at Danzig.
 His Majesty went to the theatre
 last night, with the Crown Prince
 and Crown Princess. This has not
 happened for a long time.

To-day the announcement was made
 that the Crown Prince was promoted
 to the rank of Colonel of the Prus-
 sian Army. The people are general-
 ly pleased and relieved at the end of
 the quarrel between the present and
 future Emperors. They were greeted
 enthusiastically when they attended
 the annual birthday parade in front
 of the Palace.

ABOLISH HOCKEY SCORER, TOO MUCH "PUCK HOGGING"

MONTREAL, Jan. 27.—The office
 of official scorer in the games of the
 National Hockey Association may be
 abolished next season, according to a
 statement made by President Em-
 met Quinn to-day.

The reason given is that the pub-
 lication of names of goal scorers is
 having a detrimental effect on hoc-
 key, since players are prone to be
 selfish, to "hog" the puck, and to
 attempt to do all the scoring them-
 selves, for the sake of seeing their
 names figuring among the top-notch
 goal getters.

MINISTER OF LABOR TAKES UP PORCUPINE TROUBLES

OTTAWA, Jan. 27.—The case of
 the labor leaders at Porcupine who
 recently came under the displeasure
 of the law for infringement of the In-
 dustrial Disputes Act, and who were
 sentenced to a fine of \$300 or three
 months imprisonment, is occupying
 the attention of the Minister of La-
 bor, Hon. T. W. Crothers. An ap-
 peal has been taken by counsel for
 the three men convicted against the

LONDON, Jan. 28.—It is estimated
 that the British Medical Association
 spent \$150,000 fighting the Insurance
 Act and some members of the Asso-
 ciation, who opposed the attitude
 taken by the society, are asking
 where the money was obtained. A
 special guarantee fund to protect
 those doctors who suffered by adher-
 ing to the Association's pledge not
 to take service under the Act, was
 created, but no specific authorization
 was given by the members of the As-
 sociation as a body to use this
 money.

NEW AVIATION RECORD.

PARIS, Jan. 27.—Georges Legaux,
 an aviator, this afternoon as-
 cended 11,880 feet in a monoplane,
 carrying Miss Davies, an English
 aviatrix, as a passenger. The flight
 established a new French record for
 altitude with a passenger.
