INFANTS PELISSE IN BRODERIE ANGLAISE.

There is just as much smartness and just as much style to the garments for the tiniest babies today as there is to those for their elders. Witness this little pelisse with a big granny bonnet to match, all done in English eyelet work. The whole set is fashioned from a fine handkerchief linen, each portion first cut out, then stamped and worked. The coat is fashioned with a shallow yoke over the shoulders to afford a smooth fit, and to this the double capes are attached, each one with its scalloped edge in lieu of the usual hem. The bonnet has a drawn crown, the shirring done over tiny featherbone corollings, so that they hold their shape through all the vicissitudes of the laundry; and a broader featherbone is run in as a foundation for the thick up-standing ruche that flares prettily off the face. A big rosette of liberty satin ribbon, and the fancy ribbon strings are attached with fancy pins, so that they may readily be removed for renewal.

A TRAGIC ENDING.

GUELPH, June 26.—As a result of a stupid and brutal practical joke at Mac-donald hall on Saturday night, Miss Winifred Powell, a popular young lady of this city, sustained serious injuries and had a narrow escape from death. She, with a companion, was the guest of Miss Fuller on that occasion. Owing to the heat they decided to sleep on the balcony on the top floor. They were rudely disturbed, however, for some of the students of the Ontario Agricultural College climbed the fire escape and turned on the hose. The girls thus rudely awakened were dazed and frightened, and sought protection by rushing inside. Miss Powell was in the lead and stumbled on what, in the dark-ness, she supposed was a chair, and passed around to avoid it. Instead of this, it proved to be the railing about the circular well which affords daylight, and the young lady fell the length of two floors through this, landing on the ground floor, thirty feet below. Medical aid was at once summoned and the victim was removed to her home in the ambulance. President Creelman is conducting an investigation with a view to fixing the responsibility.


