Nova Scotia Wants High-Class Settlers

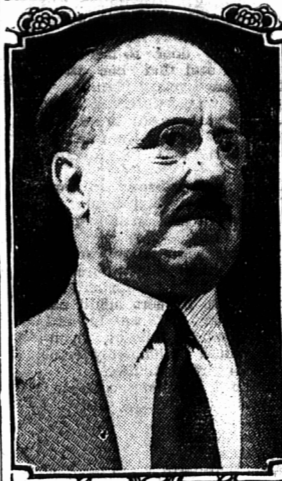
