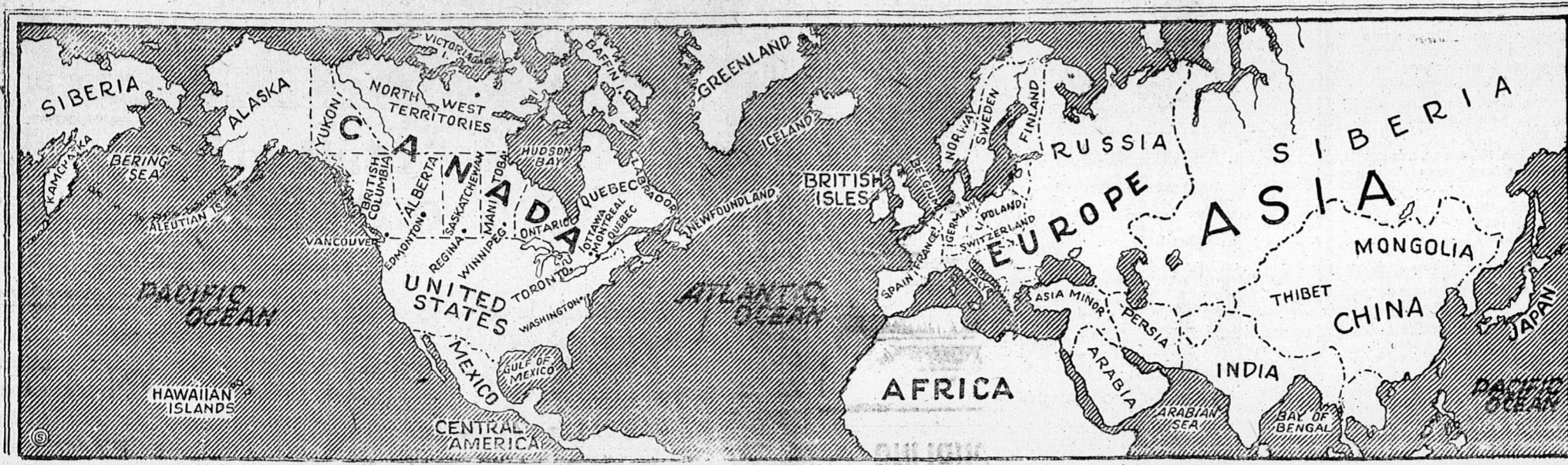


A FREE TRIP TO EUROPE

For a High School Pupil, Boy or Girl, as Champion Orator of Canada

WHO WILL ALSO COMPETE IN WASHINGTON, LATER, FOR WORLD'S CHAMPIONSHIP OPEN, WITHOUT CHARGE
TO PUPILS OF HIGH SCHOOLS AND COLLEGIATE INSTITUTES



This map of the world shows—First, the countries which the boy or girl, winner of the Canadian Oratorical Contest, will visit, without charge and with pocket money added. The countries to be visited include England, Scotland, France, Belgium and Holland. Secondly, it shows the countries from which contestants will later assemble in Washington for the championship of the world, including Canada, Great Britain, United States, France, Japan, Mexico and the Hawaiian Islands

WHO MAY ENTER

Boys and girls who on February 1, 1928 are less than 19 years of age and who are enrolled as pupils in a high school, grades nine & ten, or collegiate institute, commercial and business college, or any other recognized educational institution below University grade. Pupils in primary schools under grade nine, are not eligible.

HOW TO ENTER

In this Province of Prince Edward Island, entries may be made, either direct to The Guardian, who will forward them to the principals of the respective colleges, or to the principals themselves.

THE ORATIONS

Orations on the subject, "Canada's Future," must be original and must not take more than 10 minutes in delivery. They may be delivered in English or French.

THE DATES

School competition not later than March 1.
District finals—Not later than April 10.
Prince Edward Island finals, in Charlottetown—Not later than May 1.
Canadian finals—Not later than May 15.
European trip—Begins from Montreal early in July.
International finals, in Washington—In October.

The Charlottetown Guardian, in conjunction with newspapers in other provinces of Canada and in other countries of the world, is conducting the Canadian and International Oratorical Competitions which were so outstandingly successful last year, and from which P. E. Island was unintentionally excluded. For Canadian contestants the subject will be "Canada's Future." In individual School Competitions in Prince Edward Island, any subject may be used, but "Canada's Future" will be obligatory in the District, Provincial and Canadian Championships, and is recommended for the School Competitions.

The Contests will be open, without charge, to pupils, boys and girls, in high schools, grades nine and ten, secondary schools, collegiate institutes, Commercial and Business Colleges, and other organized educational institutions below University grade. Students of primary schools unless above grade eight, are not eligible.

The first step in the contest is for each school to hold a contest to determine its own representative. In Prince Edward Island, the province will be divided into Four districts, Kings, Queens, Prince, and Charlottetown, (including St. Dunstan's). There will be a competition at a central point for each of these districts to determine the district champion. It is at these district competitions that champions of the individual schools will compete.

The winners of each of the districts will come to Charlottetown as guests of The Charlottetown Guardian, and at its expense, to compete for the Prince Edward Island Provincial Championship. The winner of this contest will receive a suitable prize from the Guardian.

Similar competitions will be held in other provinces of the Dominion. Following these provincial championships the winner from each province will go to a selected city, probably Toronto, to compete for the Canadian Championship. The Prince Edward Island winner will go to the Canadian Contest as guest of the Charlottetown Guardian with all expenses paid.

The Canadian champion will be given a free trip this summer to Europe, a travelling scholarship, as guest of the newspapers in the various provinces which, at the request of the Canadian and International Committees, are conducting the contests.

The Canadian winner, after his European trip, will go to Washington, as guest of the International Committee, to compete in the International Championships.
