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### Late Market News

(Canadian Press)

**OTTAWA, Ont., May 13**—A firmer tone is again evident on Canadian egg markets with receipts falling off steadily in Ontario and some portions of the west.

**TORONTO**—Egg receipts are declining and the demand is keener with the market firmer. Brokers are making sales of graded Ontario shipments, ordinary packing, extras 18 cents, firsts 16 cents, seconds 14 cents delivered. The market is expected to continue firmer, particularly on the grade of extras.

**MONTREAL**—Egg receipts here today were 2,311 cases as compared to 1,992 cases for the corresponding day last year. Graded shipments on spot are selling to wholesale dealers at extras 20 cents, firsts 16 cents, seconds 14 1/2 cents, western asking prices are unchanged.

**CHICAGO**—Spot 16 3/4. May fresh 19, November refrigerators 22 1/2. **MONTREAL, Que., May 13**—A month's twelve cent decline of carlot butter prices appeared stopped to day when quotations firmed on the produce and dairy market. Cheese and egg prices also advanced while potato quotations were unchanged. Number one finest pasteurized creamery, fresh and regraded butter gained a quarter of a cent at 19 1/4 to 19 1/2 cents a pound. To retailers solids and prints continued lower both being offered at off a cent at 21 and 22 cents a pound, respectively. Receipts were 60 boxes. Ontario colored cheese advanced a quarter of a cent at nine cents lb in light trading, receipts being twenty four boxes. On the egg market carlot prices were a half to a cent higher. Fresh

### BERMUDAN WOMEN SEEK FRANCHISE

**MONTREAL, Que., May 13**—Lord Pasfield, secretary for the colonies in the British Government, is an advocate of women's suffrage in Bermuda, it is disclosed in a letter received by Mrs. John Scott of Montreal, from Mrs. John Morrell, chairman of the Bermudian Women Suffrage Society. A bill introduced for the purpose of extending the vote to women has, however, been defeated in the House of Assembly.

Mrs. Morrell said Lord Pasfield wrote of the franchise generally in Bermuda, and regarding woman suffrage stated that "the position in Bermuda would appear to call for review 'so as to bring that Colony into line with most of the rest of the Empire.'"

The official report of the Colonial Parliament of Bermuda for April 9 contained the following letter, dated March 18, from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, Lord Pasfield to the Acting Governor of Bermuda. It was given as follows:

"I have the honor to state that, as you are aware, a number of questions have lately been put in the House of Commons on the subject of the extension of the franchise in Bermuda in general and the granting of the franchise to women, and to inform you that these matters have attracted considerable attention from the members of the House.

"It has been brought to my notice that the proportion of registered electors of the total population of Bermuda is less than six per cent, which should be regarded as an abnormally low figure. I wish also to take this opportunity to point out that the franchise has by now been very generally granted to women in the British Empire at ages varying from 21 to 30 years, and that in this respect also the position in Bermuda would appear to call for review.

"I should be gratified if the Bermuda Legislature could see its way clear in the near future to consider the advisability of such an extension of the local franchise as would bring it into closer conformity with contemporary British Institutions elsewhere."

### LIVESTOCK MARKETS

**MONTREAL, Que., May 13**—There were 19 cattle, 109 calves, 345 hogs and 13 lambs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today, including about 150 hogs held over. The cattle market was unchanged. Calves were steady at \$4 for common calves to \$4 for fairly good average quality calves.

Spring lambs were steady at 14 cents to 15 cents per pound of \$5 to \$6 each. Trading on hogs was slow. Two straight loads were sold for \$8.75 and mixed lots brought \$8.50. Heavies made \$8.
