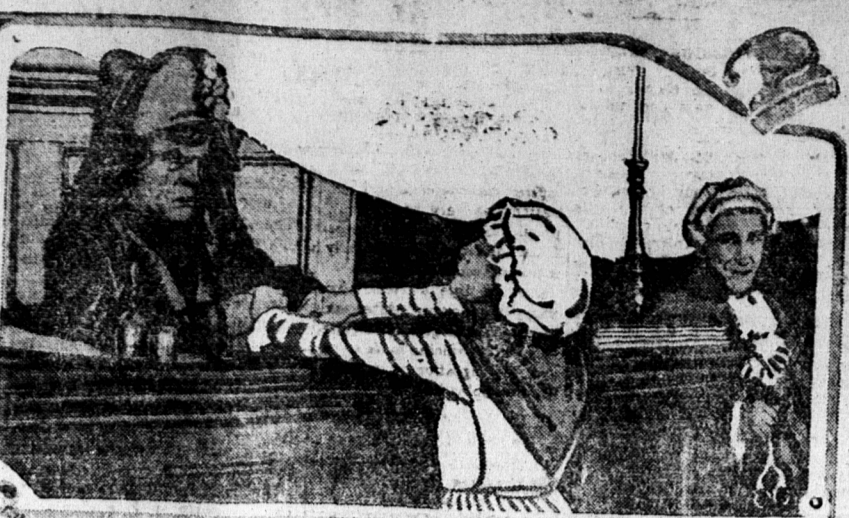

Turbulent upheavals of French Revolution Shown in "Orphans of the Storm" at the Prince Edward Wednesday and Thursday, Feb. 21-22  
"Vive le roi!"  
"Vive la republique!"  
Shouting these cries, the king's guards and the people of Paris engaged in conflict.  
It seemed as if nothing could withstand the military's murderous fire. But armed with pikes and confiscated flintlocks—urged by the Amazonian march of their women to victory or death—setting up barricades, turning the city's cannon against the Swiss and German hirelings of their royal master, the rebels overwhelmed the soldiery, captured the fortresses and in mad drunken carnage and "feasts of reason" celebrated the wreckage of the House of Capet. Followed the lynch, the massacre and the guillotine, the sorry deeds of the Reign of Terror.

One may read of the nightmare of French Revolution in any standard book, but the remarkable thing is that only a few months ago that dread period lived again on a Westchester meadow, just outside the New York City boundary and hard by the peaceful waters of Long Island Sound. D. W. Griffith, who has led all others in the reconstruction of history, revived it as a background to his dramatic epic "Orphans of the Storm," a picture version of "The Two Orphans," which Griffith wished to show that "another brings evils to the state."

With The Holsteins  
As the time for making any change in the prize list of our provincial exhibition is drawing near, a few comments on the award of ribbons on both productions and order I notice that many of our most progressive breeders are favoring the honors to workers as well as to those carrying type. And why not? It would not be hard to work out a scale for all animals from two years and up, and for the dam's and their sire's dam's could be figured on.  
Our Ayrshire breeders I notice have been awarding prizes for cows that have completed one or more R. O. P. records the record counting so many points and conformation and type the balance. This has been a good move and breeders of other breeds should adopt it or one similar to it. This would also help the judge and be more satisfactory than would be the scoring on type and conformation alone.

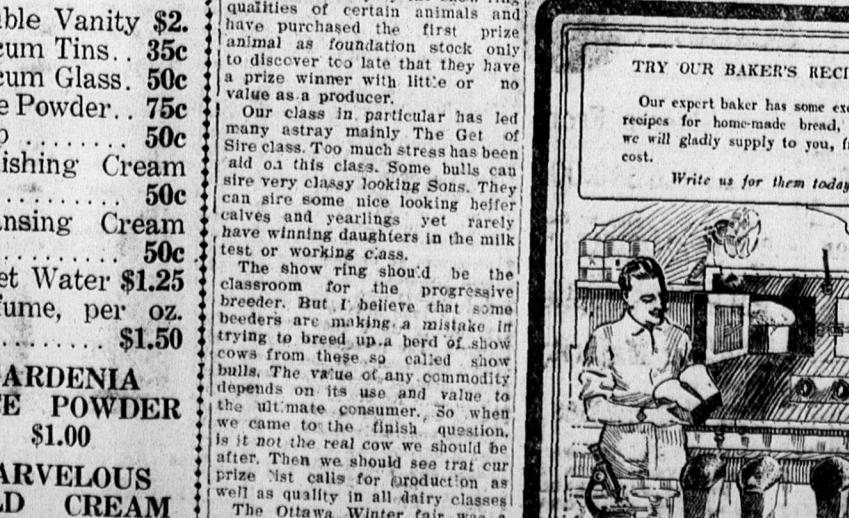
There are many instances where young enthusiastic breeders have been carried away by the show ring qualities of certain animals and have purchased the first prize animal as foundation stock only to discover too late that they have a prize winner with little or no value as a producer.  
Our class in particular has led many astray mainly The Get of Sire class. Too much stress has been put on this class. Some bulls can sire very classy looking sons. They can sire some nice looking heifer calves and yearlings, yet rarely have winning daughters in the milk test or working class.  
The show ring should be the classroom for the progressive breeder. But I believe that some breeders are making a mistake in trying to breed up a herd of show cows from these so called show bulls. The value of any commodity depends on its use and value to the ultimate consumer. So when we came to the finish question, is it not the real cow we should be after. Then we should see that our prize list calls for production as well as quality in all dairy classes.

The Ottawa Winter fair was a repetition of The Royal Ganep, and Amherst only one better as the Black and White cleared up all placings up to the fourteenth place which went to an Ayrshire.  
Again we have the fact demonstrated that Holsteins are winners and Canada is forging ahead in of cattle. Just think of developing this wonderful breed a cow producing in one year more than her own weight of butter worth
