Miss Gordon, Educational Secretary, gave an extensive report and made a strong plea for generous support from the chapters. The financial part was not the only thing of importance.

The report of the War Memorial Committee was also presented by Miss Gordon. The work is divided into three parts:

Bursaries in Canadian Universities for sons and daughters of disabled or totally disabled soldiers and sailors, overseas graduate scholarships for study in British Universities. Distribution of War Memorial pictures among Canadian soldiers.

The War Memorial Fund has now reached \$386,152 leaving still \$113,848 short of the \$500,000 which five years ago we resolved to collect as a memorial to our dead.
