To SECURE your stars and medals for World War II service with the Canadian Forces you must make application to the Director of War Service Records at the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Application should be made on a special postage-free card which is available to you at all post offices and Canadian Legion Branches.

Next of kin of those who died in service or as a result of war disabilities will receive medals and stars without application. However, next of kin of those who have died since the war, of non-service connected disabilities, must make application on the regular card.
