THE S. S. TUSSLE.—The steamer Tussle is now on the route between Charlottetown, Orwell, Crapaud, and the East and West Rivers. The Tussle is commanded by Captain Penze of La Have, N. S. The steamer is owned by the La Have Steamship Co., and is well adapted for carrying freight. She is quite a staunch little steamer, well fitted throughout and has a speed of nine knots per hour.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—Mrs. Geo. McInnis, 192 Cumberland Street, sustained a painful injury a few days ago. She was ironing and when in the act of standing on a chair to hang some clothes on a line in her kitchen when the chair tipped and she fell, striking her chest across the sharp edge of the back of the chair, fracturing one of the small bones. She suffered intense pain for some time but is now much improved.

STEAMER J. A. MCKEE.—After a trip of six days the steamer J. A. McKee, Captain Fraser, arrived in port Friday afternoon from Philadelphia with 3,000 tons of hard coal for S. Cunard and Company says the Halifax Chronicle. Her cargo is the largest coal consignment that has ever arrived here, being larger than the one which the Thomas J. Drummond discharged here last year. The cargo is made up of coal of all sizes, and the steamer will discharge at Cunard's South End Wharf. Since she was last here the McKee has had some experience. While en route to Prince Edward Island from New York she was ashore not far from the latter port. She was successfully refueled and dry docked at New York for repairs. After coming out of the dock she went to the west coast of South America, where she was engaged in trading for five months, arriving back in New York last month. She went to Philadelphia to load her cargo of coal for Halifax.

### Successful Sheep Raising

Why is it that some sheep men in every community are more successful than others? Pure luck?—once in a while, perhaps? Better land? More capital?—well, these help—but they don't begin to explain the difference in results that are secured from sheep raising nowadays.  
Go to the most successful wool growers in every part of this province, or, if you like, in any part of Canada, and ask them to explain to you why their wool brings them such good returns—and they'll tell you, almost to a man, that the real secret of their success lies in giving their flock good care and management, and then following that up by modern and efficient methods of marketing.

The successful sheepman to-day places his wool on the market properly graded and sells it direct to the mill. He does this by sending his wool to the local grading station, and then selling through the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, which is the central organization of the thirty or more local wool growers' associations that have been formed in every province in Canada. In 1918, four and one-half million pounds of Canadian wool were graded and sold through this company, nearly fifty per cent of the total clip of the Dominion.  
\* The grading is done by expert men supplied by the Dominion Live Stock Branch. The practice of grading the wool before offering it for sale, has established a market classification for our Canadian wools, gives the grower full value for the quality of wool he has for sale, and gives the manufacturer a standardized product that he is able to use to the best advantage.

On receipt of the wool at the grading station, an advance payment of sixty per cent of the value of his wool is made to the grower. After the wool is graded and sold, a grading statement and the balance of the value of his wool is sent to him promptly. All wool sent to the grading station should be unwashed, and distinctly marked with the name and address of the grower, both inside and outside each package.

The Sheep Breeders' Association of Prince Edward Island has established grading stations at Summerside and Charlottetown, where wool is now being received. Mr. J. L. Tennant is in charge at Summerside, and Mr. W. R. Shay at Charlottetown. Inquiries directed to these men will be answered clearly and promptly.

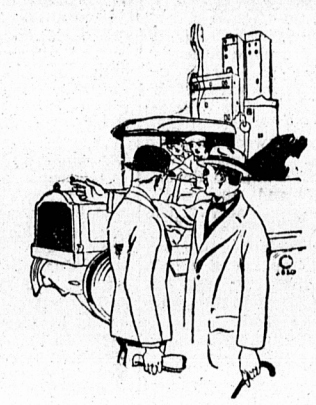
