S' side Has Enough Coal For 3 Weeks

With the co-operation of the public and by rationing their customers, Summerside coal dealers feel confident that they can supply enough soft coal for the next three weeks, by which time it is hoped that the strike will be over. The two main dealers, B. T. Holman, Ltd., and Joseph Read and Co., Ltd., have only small amounts of bituminous coal on hand, but both of them have from six to eight cars on the way. In any event there is plenty of furnace coal available and people need not be cold.
Read's report that they have a large quantity of coke on hand and some American briquets. Holman's also have a large amount of coke in their sheds and they have some hard coal as well. Householders will be expected to take either coke or hard coal for their furnaces in order to save on soft coal.
It is hoped that citizens will co-operate and not order coal if they do not need it during the present period and that all will endeavor to save as much as possible in their fuel consumption.—S.
