WALL STREET MIRROR SAYS

Realizing tendencies should be seen again in today's session but nothing more than a technical rebound is expected.

The short interest in Westinghouse is steadily expanding. It is the feeling in good quarters that trading accounts should be kept in a liquid condition for the time being and that trading lines of stocks should be held on the sidelines.

Continued to steer clear of the oil stocks. The situation in this industry has not improved at all. While a price of 30 for standard of N. J. seems pretty far fetched, nevertheless, it is expected to sell around 40.

Weakness in the rails section of the stock list is a disturbing element at this time. Railing tendencies in the rails would undoubtedly forestall further advances in the industrials and the action of the carriers should be closely watched.

The market presented a conflicting appearance yesterday. On the favorable side was the decline in volume and the comparatively better action of the rails with some strength in the utilities also.

GOVERNMENT MOUNTAIN TRAIL NEARS COMPLETION

WASHINGTON, March 4.—A new trail, extending along the summit of the Blue Ridge mountains in Virginia and connecting the northern stretches of the Appalachian Trail with the 200-mile trail system in the natural Bridge National Forest, will be completed this spring, the U. S. Forest Service announces.

When the work is finished, about 70 miles of good path in the Blue Ridge at an altitude of around 3,500 feet will have been added to the rapidly extending Appalachian Trail, which eventually will traverse the eastern mountain system of the United States from end to end.

WISCONSIN HONORS FAMED INDIAN CHIEF WITH BRIDGE

DESOTA, Wis., March 4.—Completion of the \$750,000 Black Hawk bridge, now under construction over the Mississippi river between here and Lansing, Ia., will bring to realization a dream of more than 30 years.

The bridge has been named as a memorial to a great chief of the Sac and Fox Indian tribes of a century ago. It will be exactly 100 years ago next summer that Black Hawk led his warriors in their last stand at Bad Ax on Battle Island, near here.

After his last defeat, Black Hawk traveled throughout the country making speeches. He settled in Daviess County, Ia., where he died in 1838.

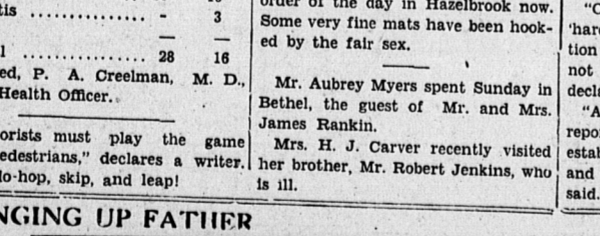

Mrs. H. J. Carver recently visited her brother, Mr. Robert Jenkins, who is ill.

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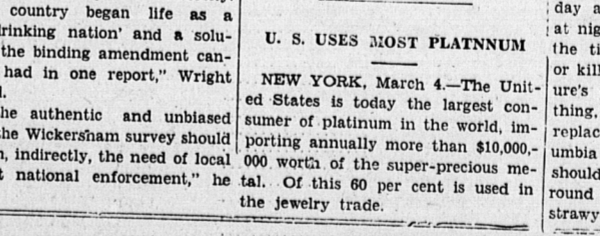
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WILKINS UNDER ICE CRUISE CONCEIVED BY ANCESTOR

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WINTER PROTECTION

Most damage to wintering plants takes place at this time and later and not during the Fall and January when the ground is usually frozen hard and the sun is not very strong. Killing results when the weather turns warm in the day time and the sap is lured up in the stems from the roots. Your innocent perennial, shrub, rose or strawberry thinks that Spring has arrived and starts to grow only to be killed back by the low temperatures during the nights. If the ground is bare, sometimes the surface will thaw during the heat of the day and then freeze and heave up at night, which movement breaks off the tiny feeding root and weakens or kills the plant. Deep snow is Nature's protection against this sort of thing, and to encourage snow or to replace it, if we live in British Columbia or other warm districts, we should cover our beds and places around our shrubbery a mulch of straw manure, leaves, burlap or miss very much by being away.
