**IN MEMORIAM.**  
Early in the dawn of Sunday morning, April 21st, 1912, at his home in New Glasgow, there peacefully passed away, after a prolonged illness, accompanied with great physical suffering, John L. Smith in the 67th year of his age. The late Mr. Smith was born in Suffolk, England, and when a little boy, came with his parents in the ship "Baltic" to Prince Edward Island, making New Glasgow his home, where he resided ever since, save a few years he spent in London, Ont., when a young man. For all that makes for a community, moral, religiously and materially, Mr. Smith stood. He was an industrious, hard working man, as evidenced by the comfortable home he has left behind. Not only was he a successful and prosperous farmer, but was also a skilled mechanic, having worked on some of the principal buildings in Charlottetown. His generation, and those who know him intimately are nearly all gone. Though his last years were full of suffering, long and intense, he was most humble and patient and fully resigned to the Divine will.

When his neighbors and friends called to see him he was cheerful and always had a good story to tell them. Now and then he would utter the cry of the human heart, "How long, O Lord, and why do I suffer so?"

When not suffering, his days were spent in quiet meditation and constant reading of his Bible. He was a good neighbor and opened his door to the stranger. He was well respected and was identified with the Christian Church at New Glasgow. He had the blessed comfort and consolation of having seen two of his sons enter the Christian Ministry.

He has served well his day and generation and after life's battle, rests from his labors.  
The funeral, largely attended, was conducted at the Christian Church, in New Glasgow. Rev. H. R. Bell, the pastor, preached a tender and sympathetic sermon from the text, "Thou shalt come to the grave, in a full age, like as a shock of corn cometh in his season." The services were simple, yet impressive.

A widow, who is in a critical condition and whose death is looked for any hour, three sons, four daughters, one brother and two sisters survive. The pall-bearers were—R. E. Bagnall, Chas. Stevenson, W. H. Stevenson, Wm. Rackham, Chas. Sellers, and Horace H. Ling.

**STEERAGE PASSENGERS DROWNED LIKE RATS.**  
WINNIPEG, April 26—That scores of steerage passengers, including women and children, were drowned like rats on the lower decks because they had been assured by the ship's officers of the Titanic that there was no immediate danger, is the statement made here by Ole K. Norman and J. M. Northless, of Bureng, Norway, who were among them. When the shock occurred, the steerage people were much alarmed and rushed up to the upper decks in all states of negligence, but were met there by officers who, partly by persuasion and partly by threats, accompanied by revolver shots in the air, herded them back below decks. A resolute hand, including Norman, stood their ground and were saved.

**LONDON HOTELS TO PAY 12 1/2 PER CENT ON MAIN INSURANCE POLICIES.**  
LONDON, April 25—The system of "Pluvius policies," by which holiday makers, hotel keepers and boarding house proprietors can insure against rainy weather, will be in operation next month, and the preliminary arrangements are now being made. Many people utilized the "Pluvius policy" last year, when the plan was first started, but owing to the record summer very few claims were received. Policies will be issued to cover a given number of resorts for any period between May 1 and September 30. The normal policy secures eight times the premium. A payment of \$4 a week will secure \$32 for each rainy week. A rainy week, for the purpose of the policy, is a week with two days on which the rainfall exceeds .20 of an inch.

**SOUTHAMPTON, April 26—**The Duke of Sutherland in an interview on the return here of the Olympic, said concerning the tests of the collapsible lifeboats:  
"I witnessed the demonstration with the collapsible boats, which were made to reassure the firemen of their safety, and the one of which they complained, shipped only a teaspoonful of water. As a yachtsman I am satisfied that nothing was wrong with it and that it was merely made the excuse for justifying the utterly unjustifiable action of the utterly negligent officers of the ship."  
The duke added that everything possible had been done on the Olympic to make the passengers comfortable during their unavoidable delay. He said he had no complaint against the company on any score. The duke will sail on the North German Lloyd steamer Prinz Friedrich Wilhelm from Southampton next Sunday.

A majority of the second and third class passengers will take passage on the steamer Philadelphia, which sails from Southampton next Wednesday.
