MEXICO CITY, April 10—While still indulging in the hope that peace methods may yet prevail, Mexico has prepared for the vigorous prosecution of the campaign against the rebels. The Chamber of Deputies, acting on the initiative of Minister of Finance Limatour, had voted \$4,000,000 gold for the "Pacification of the Country."

MEXICALI, April 10—General Williams deserted from the U. S. Army and hurried his battalion of rebels against Col. Manguel Maots, 5000 Mexican regulars on Mesa, 5 miles south of Mexicali yesterday, 80 insurgents went into the fight and 20 returned from the battlefield.
