NEW BRITISH AMBASSADOR

Cordially Welcomed to Washington by the President

Sir Henry Durand Conveyed King Edward's Expression of Kindly Sentiments Toward the United States.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Sir Henry Mortimer Durand, successor of Sir Michael Henry Herbert as the ambassador of Great Britain to the United States, was received formally by President Roosevelt at the White House at 2 30 o'clock this afternoon. At the White House the ambassador was received by Secy. of State Hay and conducted to the blue room, where he was presented to the President and Secy. Loeb. Ambassador Durand presented his credentials to President Roosevelt and was received with great cordiality.

Sir Mortimer addressed the President as follows: Mr. President—I have the honor to inform you that King Edward the Seventh, my august sovereign, has directed me to present to you in person this letter accrediting me as his ambassador to the United States of America.

"His Majesty has further directed me to assure you of his earnest desire that the friendly relations which exist between the United States and Great Britain may be maintained and strengthened, and I have received His Majesty's command to keep this object constantly in view.

"I am deeply conscious, Mr. President, of the responsibility laid upon me, and I am well aware how hard it will be for me to prove worthy of the high mission with which I have been honored. I come to America for the first time, with a warm admiration for, but without any personal knowledge of the great nation over which you have been called to preside; and I feel my inexperience the more keenly because I succeed as British ambassador here one who had passed a considerable part of his life in this country, whose sympathies with your people were therefore based upon a thorough understanding—and, I may add, whose singular charm of character endeared him to all who knew him.

"I can only say, Mr. President, that with God's help I will do my best to carry out the duty entrusted to me. No duty could be more in accord with my wishes, and it will be a very real happiness, when my work here comes to an end, if I can feel that I have been able to help in bringing about an increase of the good will between our two nations. I believe that upon this good will depends in no small degree the welfare of the world."

In replying the President said: "Mr. Ambassador,—It affords me sincere gratification to receive from your hands the letter whereby His Majesty King Edward the Seventh accredits you as his ambassador to the United States of America. Through you, the personal representa-

tive of your sovereign, I cordially reciprocate His Majesty's desire that friendship and good will between our two countries shall be strengthened and perpetuated; and with the concurrent efforts of the American government I doubt not that success will attend your endeavors to fulfill His Majesty's desire to this beneficial end. "Following, as you do, Mr. Ambassador in the steps of one whose genial sympathy with our people and whose intimate knowledge of this country stood him in good stead, enabling him to gain the confidence and esteem of this government and to win the affection of all with whom he was brought into association, I cannot doubt that you, being inspired by the same good purposes and animated by the same kindly feelings, will achieve no less than did your lamented predecessor, and merit equally with him the high regard of this government and of my countrymen. It is fitting that this should be, and that, mindful of the ties of kinship and speech, moved by like aspirations of progress in the paths of peace and sharing a reverential trust in the Almighty will that guides out destinies our two nations and peoples, through their ministering agencies, should strive to reach a harmonious accord in all that affects their common interests."

At the conclusion of the ceremony, which was brief, Ambassador Durand chatted informally with the President, before returning to the embassy.

ANOTHER HUNTING ACCIDENT.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 1.—While moose hunting in Portage la Prairie district, Albert Coates, a young farmer, received serious injuries from a bullet fired by a companion named Moffatt. Coates had just killed a moose, and Moffatt, coming up shortly afterwards, saw Coates beside the animal and fired.

DIED AT NEW GLASGOW.

HALIFAX, Dec. 1.—The death of Mrs. Dr. Honeyman took place at New Glasgow this morning at the residence of her son-in-law, F. W. Hartley. She was the widow of Dr. Honeyman, for many years curator of the Provincial Museum, Halifax.

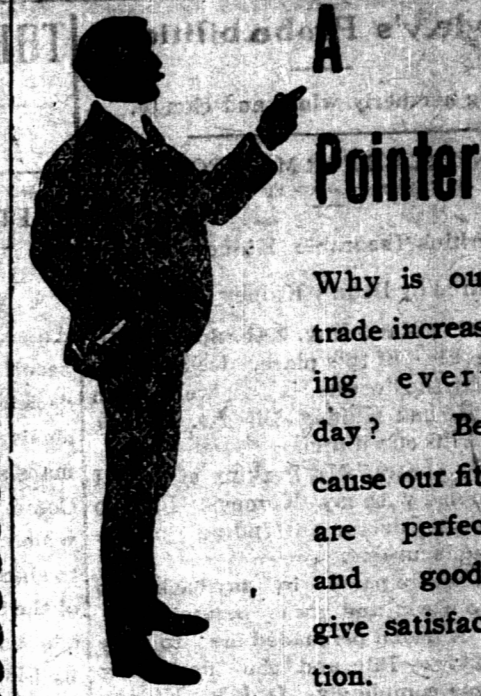
