GEESSE HERE IN LARGE NUMBERS - Game observers report that, although a few small flocks of Canada geese arrived from the south coast of weeks ago, the full flight of geese is now under way. On Saturday morning a heavy flock of honkers struck the south shore of the peninsula between St. Peter's Island and Orwell. They did not come in hundreds but literally in thousands. One interested sportsman reported that approximately one thousand geese passed over one section in less than an hour. FIREWOOD FAMINE HITS FAMILIES

Boxes make good kindling but have little value as heating or cooking fuel. But with hardwood unobtainable in the housewife in an Ottawa Valley town must burn whatever wood she can find. Fuel wood is so scarce in this Canadian town that family foodpiles are being replenished with driftwood and dead branches and old boxes—poor substitutes for good dry hardwood. Drastic firewood famine is predicted by the Department of Munitions and Supply for next winter unless half a million more cords are cut this spring.
