MARITIME UNION

Sir.—Our Prime Minister, Mr. King, is, I see, in favor of a legislative Union of the Maritime Provinces. They have learned—they have had dear bought experience of the fact—that whenever there is a question between the big interests and the little interests, the majority of our politicians never fail to side with the big and forget all about the little.

By rare good fortune the people of Little Prince Edward Island have secured the management of their own public business and affairs; and they would act like fools if they were to surrender the rights they have obtained to the manipulation of a majority of the politicians of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. As it is they can hold Canada to the bargain made with her at the time of the larger federal union, and they can control, to some extent, their local politicians in their Provincial Legislature.

The Guardian is in the right, and the Hon. Mackenzie King is in the wrong from the point of view of little P. E. I.

PREMIER KING WRONG

Sir.—"In Union there is strength." That old saying is true. But it is equally true that each man must act for himself and promote his own interests, if he is to succeed in this world and if the community to which he belongs is to prosper.

The individuals in a nation, province, or any other community being prosperous, the nation, province or any other community as a whole will also be prosperous. Upon this principle the people of Prince Edward Island must act for themselves if they are, individually and collectively, to increase in wealth and importance. Therefore the people of the Maritimes had better go on in their own way to farm their land and fish in their waters, work in their mines and factories and do what they can towards making a livelihood and so be enabled to lend strength to the great Federal Union of which they are a part.

There is no necessity for the Legislative Union advocated by Mr. Mackenzie King and other political theorists, and I can't see that there is anything to be gained by it. It is true that the Federal Government might save the few thousands of dollars a year now paid to Lieutenant-Governor Hertz and his contemporaries in the Maritimes. ELECTRICAL TRICK ON THE BUSY BEE

LONDON, Nov. 11.—An electrical hoax perpetrated on bees to make them believe that spring had arrived, was described by Mr. Borlase Matthews, the electrical farming pioneer, in a lecture to the Electrical Association of Women in London.

A beam of light, he said, was thrown on the entrance of a hive from an electric lamp. This made the sleepy bees crawl out to greet what they thought to be the sun of spring. They immediately hurried back to tell the queen bee, who began to lay eggs as fast as she could.

In front of their house the bees discovered a breakfast table laid for them—a plate of syrup seasoned with salt and vinegar, a plate of artificial pollen and plate of water. On the table also was a vase of flowers to give them an admixture of real pollen and complete the illusion.

The result was that the bees got about earlier and fertilized thoroughly the apple crop, while a gain of 17 1/2 lb of honey per hive was made.

That Car Of Yours

Heart-to-Heart Talks With Automobile Owners and Drivers on How to Get the Most Out of Their Cars at the Least Expense.

GREATER DISTANCE NEEDED

Passing another car going in the same direction is not the same simple task in Winter that it is at other seasons. The cautious motorist will remember that, under most circumstances, it is necessary to have a clear road for a greater distance ahead. This is due to the fact that there always is a chance to prevent a car into a skid by a sudden application of power or the brakes, or by a quick twist of the steering wheel. Any one of the three may be necessary if the clear stretch ahead is inadequate.

COMPENSATION IS SLIGHT

Many motor car owners still cling to the idea that under-inflation of the tires is an effective safeguard against skidding when the streets are covered with snow or ice. Perhaps, it does help—slightly. But, the gain in this respect is in nowise adequate to compensate for the vastly faster wear on the tires. There are other ways to prevent skidding that are much more effective and not nearly so costly. One is to drive more cautiously.

COLD FEET UNNECESSARY

Cold feet, in the most literal sense is a malady which grips many motor car users during Winter. Many find it the most annoying feature of driving at this season and yet they fail to take the simple steps to assure themselves relief. For the most part, the reason is to be found in the cold blast of air that comes up into the car around the brake and clutch pedals. The accessory market offers remedies, and if the right one cannot be found here, the auto body shop can fix things up very quickly. Rubber strips, made of an old tire tube, can be applied to advantage even by the home mechanic. They may not be handsome, but they keep out the cold.

KEEP A FIRMER GRIP

Usually, the snowy or icy road is filled with ruts, and ruts have a notorious habit of twisting, the steering wheel out of the driver's hands. Thus, a firmer grip on the wheel is necessary for Winter driving.

GUARD AGAINST RIM RUST

Running through slush, snow and rain, rims are especially vulnerable to rust. The rust thus accumulated not only is hard upon the tire, but it makes tire removal doubly difficult in case of a puncture. Periodic thorough cleansing with kerosene or other rust remover, and painting them with one of the numerous rim paints will repay the car owner for his trouble.

FORGETFULNESS IS COSTLY

One of the worst habits of many car owners is forgetfulness of the radiator cover or shutter until the fumes of evaporating alcohol indicate that the engine is running excessively hot. Probably this one thing is responsible for more anti-freeze-losses than any other. It does not take long for the protective fluid to disappear if this happens several times, and the wise course is to have the solution tested with a hydrometer to make certain that the freezing night will not leave the engine ice-locked.

CLEAN REFLECTORS HELP

Effective illumination is one of the most vital needs of the driver in Winter. Reflector cleanliness is a big factor in adequate lighting of the road at night. A little jeweler's rouge, dampened with alcohol and applied with a soft chamois will restore the reflector to its original brightness. After the rouge has been used, the reflector should be dried with a clean piece of chamois. It makes a noticeable difference in the quality of illumination.
