ALARMING SITUATION.

WINNIPEG, July 10—The long, cool spring greatly favored the movement of the large quantity of damp and tough wheat, and for that matter grain of all kinds. As the weather has warmed up, apprehension has been growing that there would be loss from the tough cars going forward. It seems that this apprehension was well founded, as it was learned from one of the large grain-handling firms that they were sending a special man to Fort William to investigate the matter, as conditions reported to them were certainly alarming. It was intimated also that other firms might join in the investigation. From various sources it was ascertained that the number of cars waiting on the tracks for their turn at the driers was large, running 200 upwards, and some of the cars are stated to have been standing on the tracks since the middle of May.

MONEY IN PORK.

WASHINGTON, July 11—A three-year-old Chicago boy got hold of his mother's pocketbook and fed thirty-six dollars in bills—his father's wages—to his pet guinea pigs. The father sent the remnants of the pigs' meal to President Taft Saturday with an appeal to the government to redeem the entire roll. The man is the sole support of a big family on \$17.5 a day. "You being the only one in Washington I know," he wrote to the President, "I am sending them to you."

KILLED AT BASS RIVER.

A NEW CURRENCY. PARIS, July 10—Plans in which the birth of a baby frees the tenant from payment of rent for the quarter following is an experiment in workmen's housing which is to be started in Paris, where the difficulty of lodging workmen with large families stand in close relation to the vital question of depopulation in France. This experiment for encouraging large families will be tried with four blocks of workmen's flats built by Charles Stern at Vincennes, an eastern suburb of Paris. The block consists of two, three and four-roomed flats at rents respectively of \$50, \$65, and \$80 a year. The profits remaining after the cost of construction and working expenses have been deducted, will go to a maternal canteen of the district, where mothers nursing babies will be supplied with lunch and dinner free of charge. The flats include baths, wash houses and library, and a dispensary for the care of new-born infants.

CANCER TREATED SUCCESSFULLY. HELDELBERG, July 10—At a meeting of the National History Association, Professor Winnewisser described some very favorable results from the treatment of cancer by the injection of chlorine. He said that in animals the disease had been entirely eradicated, while of fifty-six persons treated at the Heidelberg hospital had shown the most beneficial results.

The holding company will be called the Ferrocarriles Internacionales de Centro America, and bonds aggregating \$30,000,000 gold have been authorized for the connecting line that will link together the roads already in operation. Behind the plan is said to be the Hamburg-American Steamship Company, which expects to control the fruit trade in connection with the United Fruit Company. The new corporation will possess lines from Port Barrios, on the Caribbean, through the city of Guatemala, to the ports of Champerico and San Jose on the Pacific. Connections will be made with the lines from Ocosingo, Vado Ancho and the cities of La Union, San Miguel and Usulután in Salvador, which will monopolize the growing fruit traffic and force exportations from the lower Mexican ports connecting with the Pan-American line. That this arrangement will affect American interests now in control of the trade is claimed by Spanish-speaking statesmen familiar with the deal, and the struggle for supremacy is not expected to be confined to purely commercial competition.

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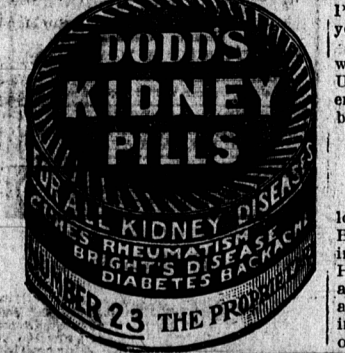
