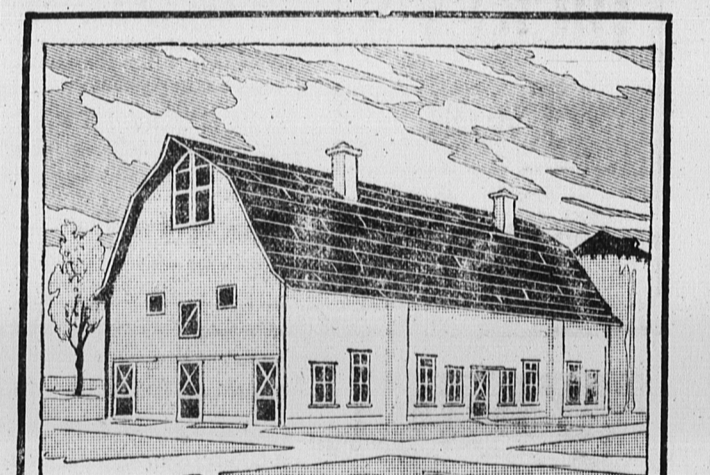

MOTOR CYCLE RACE.—A feature of the races to be held at New Annan on Wednesday, August 22nd, will be a motor cycle race. This event is open to the maritime provinces. So far there is one competitor entered from St. John, N.B., one from Summerside and two from Charlottetown, and others are expected. About twenty-five entries have been received for the horse races, which will consist of a free-for-all, a 2.25 trot and pace (opened for Kiltie and Brenton H.) and a 2.38 mixed class.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.—The District Sunday School Convention at Graham's Road on Friday, Aug. 3rd was a decided session in every respect. The afternoon session presided over by the vice pres. Mr. John Murray, was conducted largely by the Field Secy, Mr. Ross. He fully explained in his own definite, lucid style the system of standardizing the Sunday Schools of the District. He pointed out very clearly that such organization is absolutely essential to efficiency and progress. The evening session was more largely attended. Rev. G. W. Irvine presided. After reports of committees had been submitted and adopted, Mr. Ross delivered a powerful address along the same line as in the afternoon. Toward the close of his splendid address he urged upon all S. S. workers and all parents to attend to the spiritual wants of those children entrusted to their care. This can be done more efficiently by improved methods of conducting the schools and also improved modern methods of teaching the "old story." 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WOMEN WHO WED SLACKERS MAY BE SENT TO JAIL. WASHINGTON.—Women who marry men who have been drafted with the idea of aiding them to escape military service are as liable as their slackers' hands to be sent to jail, according to an announcement made tonight by Provost Marshal General Crowder. General Crowder authorized local exemption boards to warn persons who claim exemption on the ground of marriage contracted since the Draft law became effective on May 18 "that both parties are liable to prosecution" under the provision making it a misdemeanor for any one to evade the act or for any one to aid another to evade its requirements.
