Parliament Deals With Nova Scotia Coal Situation (Canadian Press) TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 20.—Toronto Globe today publishes the following despatch from its Ottawa correspondent, under date of Feb. 19: 'The plight of the coal industry in Nova Scotia is receiving the attention of the Dominion Cabinet, the Globe was informed authoritatively tonight, but pending final decision as to the government's policy, it is not possible to forecast what Parliament will be asked to do with respect to the recommendations of the Duncan Commission, which Premier Harrington of Nova Scotia released today. 'There is no doubt that more Nova Scotia coal would be used in Quebec and Ontario coking plants if the Domestic Act were amended so that the coking plants could qualify for the federal subsidy of a minimum of 33 1-3 per cent. of

Keen Watch Kept On Developments At Shanghai

LONDON, Feb. 20.—(A.P.)—Members of the Cabinet sub-committee formed some time ago to keep an eye on events in the far east resolved today to stay in or near London over the weekend in order that they might take any action necessary. Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Lord President of the Council, presided over the sub-committee session in the absence of Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald, who is at his country home at Chequers, but Mr. MacDonald is keeping in closest touch with developments. The Cabinet sent instructions to the British Consul General at Shanghai, J. F. Brennan, to do his utmost to insure the safety of British Nationals in the Shanghai area, who are estimated to number 4,000 women and children and 5,000 men. It was said the British naval command at Shanghai had been ordered to evacuate British subjects in case that step became necessary.

MR. MICHAEL J. LONERGAN

The death took place in Stellarton, N. S., of Michael J. Lonergan, a brother of James Lonergan of this city. Mr. Lonergan was a veteran of the South African War having served as Mounted Signaller with the Royal Dublin Fusiliers. He was stationed for seven years with the Dublin Fusiliers in Bombay, India, and at Quetta on the Russian frontier. He came to Charlottetown in 1903 after taking his discharge from the regiment in London, Eng. For the past 28 years he has been located at Stellarton where he was employed at the Allan Shaft. He leaves widow and three sons and one daughter.

FRANCHISE FOR WOMEN

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Feb. 20.—Several Bermudian legislators hitherto opposed to the political enfranchisement of women have expressed their conversion and promised to support a petition now being prepared for presentation to Colonial Parliament this month and designed to prove there is a strong body of local opinion favoring this change. The campaign for electoral reform has, however, steadily gained in momentum and women suffrage leaders are now confident that their goal is within measurable distance of attainment.
