King Square Rangers Win Bantam Title

Forbes Kennedy's King Square Rangers, shooting a goal five minutes after the start of the overtime session yesterday morning defeated Parkdale Bantams 2-1 to capture the bantam championship of the City. The game was the final in a tournament that started out with thirteen teams competing and by their victory Rangers kept intact their season's undefeated record, in addition to local games having chalked up victories over out-of-town squads. Yesterday's encounter was a battle royal all the way with both teams being very evenly matched and playing a wide open rugged brand of hockey. Parkdale after a scoreless first period opened the scoring early in the middle session when Carr denied the Saints on a play with Cheverie and then held off the onslaughts of the Rangers for the remainder of the period to enter the third session with their slim lead intact. For over eight minutes of the third the score remained unchanged. Things looked dark for the Rangers as two players rested in the penalty box but their opponent's efforts turned into a boom-crash when Burke fed a pass by McLure broke into the clear to notch up the equalizer and send the teams into overtime. Payoff Counter

And then came Mahar's payoff counter as he sliced his way around the hard-hitting Navy defence to beat Davis with an arkle high drive to the open corner that sealed the game Navy team's fate. But it was a crowd pleaser all the way. Pre-game favorites, the intercollegiate champions soon found out they were in for a mighty tussle. Coach Walter Lawlor dumped over the boards a squad of hockey players that came through with their best performance of the year. Led by the three-star performer of swivel hipped Johnny Higson, centring another pair of stars in Jackson and Ted Bradley and supported by a smart goalie, a hard-hitting set of defencemen, and a second line that back-checked like demons, Navy battled it out on even terms with their opponents all through the piece and it was a heart-breaking loss for them as they fell victims to Joe Mahar's counter in the sudden-death session after all but having the game sewed up in the first two minutes of the first overtime session.

Higson Gets Six Goals

Leading the goal-getting parade was Higson of the Navy squad with six goals rattling off in quick succession. Mahar of the Saints had five with Cart McDonald accounting for four; Ted Bradley fired two into the cage with the others going to McDougall and Gordie Kelly, the latter's goal tying the game up for the Navy late in the third period. Battling scorelessly for over eight minutes with both teams missing chances, Cart McDonald set off the scoring spark at 8:07 with an unassisted effort and before the four-teen minute mark had been reached, Saints led 3-0 as McDougall and then McDonald again worked in for goals. Navy suddenly finding their scoring eye surged back with two goals by Higson and Bradley in the space of 41 seconds to get back into the running and in the last couple of minutes of play forced MacKinnon to spectacular heights to prevent them from shooting the tying marker.

Mahar's Sudden-Death Counter Gives University Team 10 To 9 Victory

A sudden death overtime goal from the stick of Joe Mahar his fifth counter of the game, last night catapulted Jackie Kane S. D. U. hockey squad into the finals of the City Hockey League against Drillon's Legionaires, Mahar's goal giving the Saints 10-9 margin in one of the most exciting, and closely fought counters witnessed all season long. Playing wide-open hockey after getting off to a slow start Saints went into a 3-0 lead in the first thirteen minutes of play to make it appear as if they would win in a walk but they reckoned without the gameness of their opponents. Before that first period had ended Navy had drawn up to within a counter of the Saints. They came back to match the Saints goal for goal in a torrid second session and then in a grueling third period shot the odd marker in three to knot the count 7-7 and send the game into overtime.

Ice with a 6-5 lead.

Starting fast in the third period the winners made their margin 7 in two minutes and 20 seconds with Mahar denting the twines on play with McIsaac after MacKinnon and Davis had come through with remarkable saves. It took Navy team over six minutes to get that one back with Bradley clicking on a play with Josey and the with only five minutes and 35 seconds of regular playing time left in the Navy's second line took a hard hit in the scoring as hard-worked Gordie Kelly fired in Hennessey rebound to stalemate the twines at seven goals apiece. Higson and Bradley, thorns on the sides of the Saints all during the game, came through with quick ones in the first overtime Higson getting both of them in rebound on a flip shot from three feet and next one on a go-mouth pass that MacKinnon had little chance on.
