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NAZI ENVOY TO WASHINGTON RECALLED

FRANCE HASTENS ACCORD WITH DICTATORS

ITALO-GERMAN PACTS SOUGHT TO END UNREST

French Cabinet Prepares For Conversations With British Leaders

PARIS, Nov. 18 (AP)—Premier Edouard Daladier's Government undertook today to hasten accords with Germany and Italy as steps toward quieting domestic and foreign disturbances.

The cabinet meeting under President Lebon, reviewed the present situation extensively in preparation for the arrival here Wednesday of Prime Minister Chamberlain and Foreign Secretary Halifax of Great Britain.

The principal objective of both French and British ministers was understood here to be completion of tariff pacts with Berlin and Rome to complement the Anglo-Italian accord and facilitate negotiations between London and Berlin.

"OPEN DOOR" CLOSED:— Japan Replies To U. S. Note

TOKYO, Nov. 18 (A. P.)—Japan denied today point by point every charge in a United States note demanding maintenance of the "open door" in China and asserted that "ideas and principles of the past" no longer apply in China's "new situation."

Geo. A. Callbeck Prominent Fox Winner At Fair

A wire received from Toronto yesterday morning states that Mr. George A. Callbeck's entries in the Fox Show at the Royal Winter Fair won 18 firsts, six seconds, and three thirds as well as other minor prizes up to the time the extra pale pups were being judged.

The result to date achieved by Mr. Callbeck is equal to about one-half of the first prize of the entire show and is a remarkable achievement showing that Prince Edward Island foxes are still supreme in the show ring in competition with the best that Ontario and western Canada can produce.

TORONTO, Nov. 18 (CP)—George A. Callbeck, Summerside, P. E. I., tonight capped a great series of prize winning efforts in the Royal Winter Fair by winning two special awards and taking second place in two others.

His foxes won the Holt, Renfrew and Comyn Trophy for champion adult male fox, whelped previous to 1937, and the Province of New Brunswick Trophy for champion adult male fox.

TWO KILLED IN PLANE CRASH NEAR REGINA

CHAMBERLAIN GOVERNMENT LOSES SEAT

LONDON, Nov. 18 (CP Cable)—The Foreign Policy of Prime Minister Chamberlain's Government received another setback as the ballot box today when the Conservative Party lost Bridgewater in a by-election.

Running as an Independent Progressive, Vernon Bartlett, London newspaperman and former radio commentator on foreign affairs, won the traditionally Tory seat by 2,322 votes. In the last election this seaborne rural riding returned the Conservative Candidate, R. P. Croom-Johnson, whose election to the bench created a vacancy in the House of Commons by a majority of 10,489 over his nearest rival in a three-party contest.
